Austria has stood for liberty for all. After the great World war France demanded that Austria must be broken to pieces and from her vast territory has come the countries of Czechoelovskis Yugozlavis, Bulgaria, Boumania and a part of Poland. Her area is now just one-eighth of what it was before the World war, and the population is now only two million

it was before the World war, and the population is now only two million France has also forbidden an economical alliance between Austria and Germany for fear they might some day become powerful enough to regain Alsace Lorraine. Austria is a member of the League of Nations and through the league, she has been loaned millions of dollars and like all other Furonean nations is a great all other European nations is a great debtor of the United States of Amer-

Austria is a federal, democratic republic, legislative power is vested in a federal diet of two houses, an assembly and an advigory first chamber.
