

SPARROW FRIENDS FAR AND NEAR AID MEMORIAL CLINIC

From Dixon, Ill., comes the latest contribution to the Alex Sparrow Memorial clinic, and with it an expression of the great loss realized in the death of the late Judge by J. T. Little, formerly of this city.

The worthiness of such a project and appropriateness of establishing a health clinic as memorial to Judge Sparrow, known throughout the county for his understanding and low of children, are emphasized in Mr. Little's letter. His contribution to the clinic he presents with the hope that all the funds needed to establish the memorial fund will be easily raised.

Other recent contributors, announced by Mrs. Lewis Ulrich of the Jackson County Public Health Association, sponsors of the memorial, are: Mr. and Mrs. T. E. Daniels, the Messes Carlson, H. D. McCaskey and the Talent Grange.

Many other individuals and organizations, with whom the late Judge was associated, have also contributed to the health clinic, which will constitute an important part of the new county courthouse at the corner of Main and Oakdale.

Sponsors of the clinic expect to establish not only a health clinic which will expand with the years, but a permanent memorial fund for child welfare work, to be used in the pursuit of better health for all children of Jackson county.

All persons planning to use this medium for expressing their love of Judge Sparrow, are urged to submit their contributions as soon as possible, as the committee must know the amount of money to be used in the clinic before the construction of the courthouse progresses much further. The members are now awaiting the completion of the list of donors to make definite plans.

Any amount of money will be welcomed by the committee as the hope of the group is to make the memorial a true expression of appreciation felt for Judge Sparrow in all sections of the county. Anyone who wishes to add her gift, however small it may be, is invited to do so.

LIEUT. LINDLEY QUITS COMMAND

It will be with much surprise that the Medford public learns First Lieutenant Geo. P. Lindley, second in command of Company A, 186th Infantry, has resigned from the Oregon National Guard, his resignation to take place April 10th, as Lieutenant Lindley had been a member of Company A ever since it was organized in 1910, and had been an officer of this unit for the past 10 years.

The resignation, which was tendered some time ago for the reason that because of his having engaged in business as a partner in the new hardware firm of Pick and Lindley recently established in Medford, he therefore is unable any longer to give the necessary time to national guard and company matters.

DE VALERA'S VISIT HERE REMEMBERED BY SONS OF ERIN

Eamon DeValera, new president of the Irish Free State, who has recently been in the limelight because of his declared intention of abolishing the oath to England, and of retaining for the state the land annuity payments, was a visitor in Medford for 10 or 15 minutes, about 12 years ago, and is well remembered by a large group of Medfordites who met him on the depot platform during that stay.

On his tour of the United States at that time, DeValera was agitating against England's rule of Ireland, and soliciting financial aid for his cause. His party, including his secretary and the mayor of Wexford, Ireland, was en route from Portland to San Francisco.

Quite a number of citizens of Irish nationality, and others, were assembled at the depot, and the future president of Ireland was introduced all around, giving each a hearty handshake. The tall, gaunt man of tremendous personality and earnestness, made a pleasing impression.

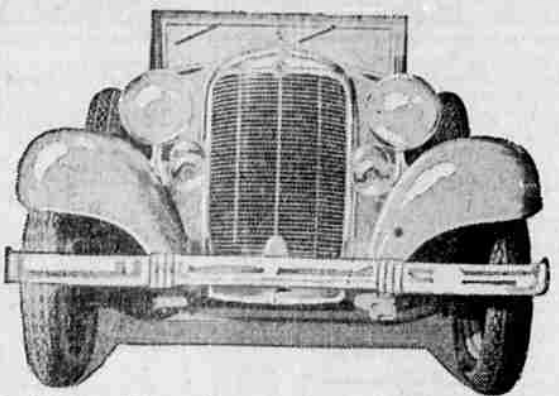
Bishop Cissy of Portland, head of the Catholic diocese of Oregon, happened to be on the same train en route to San Francisco, and joined in the greeting at the depot. The writer had a moment's talk with Mr. DeValera, and Owey Patton was also one of the welcoming crowd. Owey remained on the train when it pulled out and rode with the DeValera party as far as Ashland, sharing a seat with the mayor of Wexford, a fact of which the latter official has ever since been very proud.

WEATHER SLOWS HUNT FOR BODIES OF RANCH COUPLE

Search for the bodies of Edwin C. The snow, however, continues to thaw, which will aid the searchers when the hunt is resumed. Neighbors of the elderly couple believe that the bodies will be found soon and in sight of the Brown cabin. The Browns were former residents of Los Angeles who moved to the Dead Indian district 18 months ago. Brown was in poor health and said to be suffering from a heart affliction. Neighbors, headed by A. R. Cooley, at whose home the Browns were visitors before they started in a storm for their cabin, found snowshoe tracks, indicating that the ill-fated couple had battled the storm and fell down frequently, and that at one time they had passed within a short distance of their own cabin.

Brown has a brother living in Palo Alto, Cal., and other kin residing in Montana.

GLASGOW, Scotland, April 4.—(Sp.)—It was officially reported here today that Major Charles H. Schoeffel of the New Jersey state police will arrive tonight from London. It was understood he was coming to interview a Mrs. Taylor, the mother of the Lindbergh nurse, Betty Gow.

There was a feeling among the police authorities here that "something of considerable importance" may be the outgrowth of Major Schoeffel's visit.

LONDON, April 4.—(Sp.)—Major Charles H. Schoeffel of the New Jersey state police, who came here in connection with the investigation of the kidnapping of Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., visited Scotland Yard this morning and conferred with high police officials there.

Major Schoeffel has been dubbed "mystery man" by a host of newspaper men who have vainly sought some trace of him since he landed in England.

NURSE'S DAMAGE SUIT OPENED IN NORTON'S COURT

The damage suit of Florence May, nurse at the county poor farm at Talent against J. C. Ottinger for \$6150 alleged damages as the result of an auto accident on the Pacific highway last August opened today in circuit court. Selection of a jury and opening statements were completed this morning.

The plaintiff alleges that she was a guest passenger of C. Tabor in his auto and with the Tabor had attended a theater in this city. On the homeward trip it is claimed that Tabor attempted to turn his car into the poor farm driveway when it was struck by the Ottinger auto, driven at a high rate of speed, causing severe injuries to Miss May. Reckless driving and poor lights are also alleged. The defense is represented by Attorney Frank J. Newman and the plaintiff by Attorney Don Newbury.

Next case on the docket is that of George M. Becker against Alex Anderson and Bill Gibson for \$5000 damages. The action is based on an altercation that occurred at the Ivy street market over a year ago.

The jury trial calendar will be completed with the hearing of the damage suit of Harriet A. Brimhall against the Southern Oregon Gas corporation, another action that arose from a Pacific Highway auto crash.

With two short equity cases this completes the docket for the present term of court which is expected to be finished this week.

around a family of free-spending child, dressed with a very "Scotch"-like father. The method by which the always arising difficulties are ironed out is presented very cleverly.

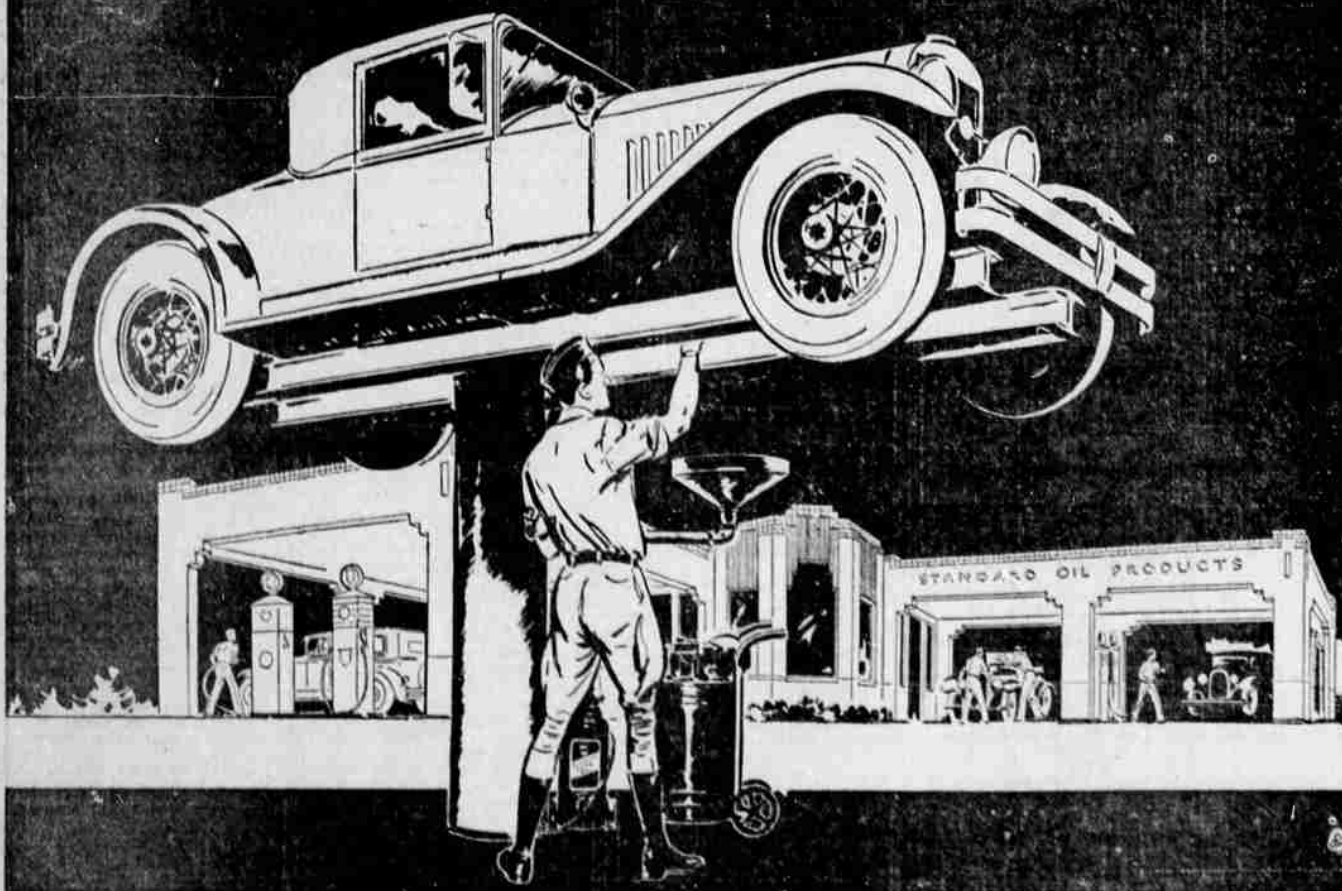
Nab Boy Burglars.
