

PORTLAND DROPS OPENING TUSSLE TO LOS ANGELES

Free Hitting Game Ends, 18-14, After Beavers Lose Early Lead—Frisco Seals Win From Seattle

(By the Associated Press) The long trail leading to the 1932 Pacific Coast baseball championship beckoned today to the eight teams which participated in yesterday's season opener.

Opening victories went to the Oakland A's, Sacramento Senators, Los Angeles Angels, and San Francisco Seals, 1931 champs. Oakland celebrated the opening by shutting out Hollywood, 5-0.

The home fans in Sacramento saw the Senators take the inaugural from the Missions, 7-3. Tony Freitas, southpaw ace, pitched and batted his team to victory.

Portland and Los Angeles put on a slugging contest on the latter's field which approached old-time slug lot proportions, but the Angels slugged a little harder and won the game, 18-14.

San Francisco started another pennant chase with a close 2-1 win over Seattle. The game developed a pitching duel between Bill Henderson of the Seals and Rudy Kallio of Seattle.

PHAR LAP, WONDER HORSE DIES FROM COLIC ATTACK

MENLO PARK, Cal., April 6.—(AP)—All the world of turf and thorough-breds mourned today the passing of Australia's wonder horse—giant Phar Lap—whose name has been lowered in the final chapter of a career as glamorous as any in the history of racing.

As suddenly as the lightning from which he drew his name in Senegal-ese across the sky, came the news yesterday afternoon of his death.

Only a little more than two weeks ago this great red gelding, monarch of Australian turf, had signalled his North American invasion by winning the rich Angus Galente, Mexico, handicap, a matter of \$50,000. He was quartered contentedly in private stables here, awaiting a special race at Tanfong track.

Phar Lap died from one of the most common causes that snuff away the lives of horses—colic. Autopsy showed the great thoroughbred had died from the effects of green feed nibbled from a California field.

A bit of fustil, or alfalfa or barley, sodden with dew is thought to have induced the colic that snuffed out a life valued at \$500,000 by D. J. Davis of San Francisco, joint owner with Harry Telford of Australia, of the mount and through whose influence it was brought to this country.
