BANWELL RESIGNS AS DEVELOPMENT ASSN. SECRETARY

The resignation of A. H. Banwell, secretary-manager for the past two and a half years of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association, was received today by C. E. Gates, president of the association, following Mr. Banwell's return from a trip south in the interests of the association.

The general retrenchment program of the federal government, which has apparently prevented development of the Crescent City harbor, leading project of the association; and general lack of financial support, resulting from the depression, were given by Mr. Banwell as reasons for resigning, when he was interviewed this morning.

Although he received a favorable report from the coast and district army engineers' board, the retrenchment policy of the government has made it impossible for the present time to advance the development desired in this region.

No plans for the future were announced.

Mr. Gates, when interviewed, said that he was preparing a statement for the Sunday Mail Tribune regarding the outlook for the association. He made it emphatic that Mr. Banwell's resignation had resulted from no lack of effort and accomplishment on his part, but from the general financial conditions prevailing. During the time he acted as secretary-manager of the association, Mr. Banwell conducted five hearings and conferences and worked up a vast amount of data, gaining far-reaching publicity for the Northern California-Southern Oregon empire. The activities of the association have acquainted the peoples of many countries with the resources of this region.

Mr. Banwell had wide experience in similar fields of work before assuming his position with the North-

development association, coming to this city from Tacoma, Wash., where he was director of publicity for the chamber of commerce.
