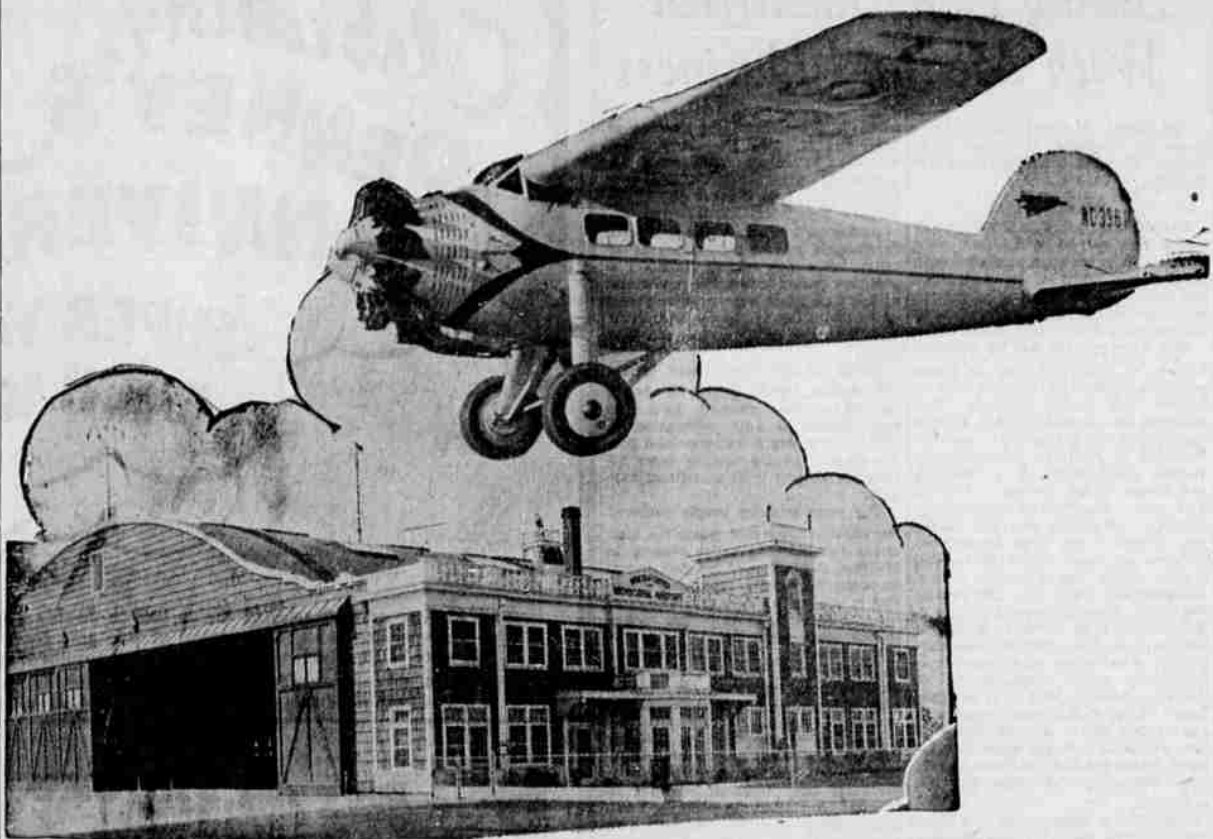

Medford Airport Important Stop



GROWING TRAFFIC KEEPS BIG STAFF BUSY ALL HOURS

Cutting through the horizon's blue, to light birdlike at a marked airfield—later to rise slowly and disappear in the misty haze of an ethereal world—upon these actions of mechanical craft hinge hundreds of duties daily at the Medford municipal airport.
Since establishment of the Medford airport an increasing traffic of planes on United Air Lines schedules, private craft and army and navy machines are making use of the facilities.
At sunrise Saturday preparations were made at the port to greet the first passenger and mail plane, a 40-2-4, to arrive here from Oakland at 6:45 a. m., having left Los Angeles Friday night at 10:45 o'clock. From the postoffice, where the mail was weighed, D. M. McDannels took it to the airport at 6 a. m., and placed it in the mail room until the arrival of the ship.
Reservations on the plane were checked by the United Air Lines local superintendent, Phil Sharp, and reports of the mail made by him. When the plane was within a hundred mile radius of Medford, the operator in the dispatch room sent out a weather report of conditions in the valley. Each 20 minutes the plane reported its position, and the dispatcher communicated, according to time allotments on the schedule clock.
The mail was exchanged when the ship arrived, while the plane was refueled. In keeping with government regulations, a weather report was made out for the pilot by the U. S. weather bureau located on the second floor of the airport building, and given the fliers by Mr. Sharp. Department of commerce rules make it necessary for reports to be compiled on hourly information received on the teletype.
The United Air Lines pilot who flew the plane to Medford, Grover Tyler, registered before leaving the airport, so that he might be located at any time if an emergency flight became necessary.
While waiting for the plane to be refueled, the four passengers sat in the reception room, walked around the hangar and enjoyed the sunshine and lawn in front of the building. The plane was taken out by Charles Stead.
Routine work about the port, with the dispatch operators keeping in touch with the ships and ground stations of the line, as well as keeping a station log of all radio activities, kept the dispatchers busy until time for the 12:20 tri-motor mail

and passenger craft from Portland. Weather records, and obtaining necessary data, occupy the major part of the time of W. J. Hutchison, meteorologist, and his assistants, Kenneth Anderson, C. W. Ahlborn, C. F. Penfield and W. R. Crum. A 24-hour service is furnished from this office.
A telephone system between the dispatcher's room and the weather department makes it possible for the dispatchers to furnish the planes and ground stations with any data concerning weather.
At noon the mail arrived for the big ship, and the radio departments obtained information from Pilot Al Davis as to the number of passengers, the amount of mail, and the destinations of the travelers.
Lunches were prepared by Dean Dow of the Airport cafe for 10 passengers continuing south.
Other aviators taking planes north, who are stationed at Medford, are H. C. Miller, Harold Adams and Frank Anderson, and going south are H. V. Lofland and Ralph Verdin. Continuous service is given in the dispatch room by Ken Williams, Bill Rosenbaum, Phil Showalter and Cliff Hannum.
In the hangar, assisting Mr. Clarkson with the refueling of private planes making frequent sojourns, is Tom Culbertson, who flies his own ship, Marshall Seagrave has his J-6-7 Traveler at the port, and W. H. Fisher, W. H. Mulhens and Floyd Hart also station their plane in the city hangar.
Throughout the morning, William Clarkson, city superintendent of the

airport, was busy yesterday making repairs on the U. S. Loening amphibian, en route to Alaska, where the navy lieutenants will make an air photographic study of Kodiak island. The ships left Saturday afternoon for the north.
Lieuts. R. H. Harrell, J. R. W. Vest and J. C. Tafforty, E. O. Roger and A. C. Shaffer made up the crews of two pilots and a radio technician in each amphibian.
E. L. Yuravich of Washington, D. C., federal airways inspector, flying a five-place Balanca with a Wright J-6-9, 300-horsepower engine, took off yesterday from the Medford airport for Redding and Oakland, Cal., to inspect the federal radio beams, having checked the one about a mile and a half from the Medford airport.
As the amphibians disappeared northward, three army P-12-F planes, en route to Crisley field from Seattle, stopped at the Medford airport to refuel before continuing southward. Pilots were Capt. Wm. Morris, Capt. C. E. Duncan and Lieut. E. W. Anderson. They took off about 3 o'clock.
The tri-motor from the south was set down at the port, at 3 p. m. Saturday and was refueled, with the ground crew aiding in placing the mail in the ship. A co-pilot and stewardess travel on each of the tri-motors, the stewardesses being graduate nurses.
Beacons about the valley and the airport cast their lights for miles to guide the 40-B-4 stopping at Medford at 10:35 p. m., when lunches for passengers are placed on the ship and the mail transferred.

Rail Trip East Via California Costs No More

Effective May 22 with the annual offering of reduced rail round trips to eastern destinations, travelers from this city and most western Oregon points will have the privilege of including California on their trip at no additional fare over going directly east and back, according to J. C. Carle, local agent. Mr. Carle also said the new low fares would be decidedly lower than last year and would be featured by the offering of new 30-day limit round trips at fares which hit new low levels.
Removal by Southern Pacific of the extra charge formerly applied for going east via California opens up an entirely new choice of routings for the east-bound traveler from this territory, Mr. Carle said. From here to Chicago, for example, the traveler can swing through San Francisco and Los Angeles and thence to Chicago, returning via different route through California or circling back via the northern line, or reversing the direction, for the same fare as to go directly to Chicago and back.
