

BEAR OARSMEN WIN TWO FROM HUSKY SHELLS

SEATTLE, Wash., April 9.—(AP)—Zooming down the choppy, sun-speckled waters of Lake Washington on the wings of a stiff "southeaster," a brawny brand of California Bears today handed the Washington Huskies the worst beating any crew has ever suffered in 29 years of Pacific Coast intercollegiate rowing.

Eighteen lengths separated the two famous crews as the southern veterans flashed over the finish line in 16 minutes and 49 seconds in the three-mile varsity race.

Two Pacific Coast titles went to California today. The Blue and Gold junior-varsity smothered the Washington second boat by six lengths in a three-mile row, taking 17 minutes and 14.9 seconds to cover the distance.

Washington's only salvation came in the freshman two-mile race when the Husky Pups conquered the "Cal-Cubs" by three and one-half lengths in surprising fashion. The winning boat was clocked in 11 minutes, 41 seconds.

FAMOUS DRIVER COMES MONDAY FOR GAS TESTS

Earl Cooper, who has made racing history on the dirt and brick track, will come to Medford Monday to conduct a series of demonstrations here for the Union Oil company. COURT POSTPONES WINDUP OF AUTO CRASH LITIGATION

Circuit Judge H. D. Norton late Friday excused the jury in the damage suit of Charles Humphreys against D. O. Morgan and Tracy Morgan of Josephine county until a week from Monday, when they were directed to return and receive instructions of the court. Evidence and the

final arguments of counsel were completed late Friday afternoon. Humphreys seeks \$5000 damages as the result of an auto crash on the Green-springs highway a year ago.

Judge Norton will hold court all next week in Grants Pass, returning here for court Monday, April 18. The damage suit of Mrs. Helen Brimhall against the Southern Oregon Gas corporation is scheduled for the week. The suit arose from an auto accident on the Pacific highway last summer.

It is also expected that arguments on the motion for a new trial in the libel suit of Roy H. Parr against the Pacific Record Herald and Earl H. Fehl, its editor, will be heard during the week of April 18. Both sides have filed numerous affidavits. Parr was awarded a \$15,000 verdict against the publication and editor.

MAJOR BASEBALL OPENING FANFARE IN ENSUING WEEK

NEW YORK, April 9.—(AP)—Featuring the fanfare and pageantry for which it has long been famous, major league baseball's big show sounds the overture next week for a prospective "return to the big business of American sport."

The prospects are for an auspicious as well as gala getaway. The nation's chief executive, Herbert Hoover, will make the first official gesture by throwing out the ball for the prelude, to be played by Boston and Washington clubs at the capitol on Monday afternoon.

All sixteen clubs swing into action Tuesday.

The largest of Tuesday's crowds—40,000—is expected to jam Brooklyn's enlarged park for the jolly "Dodgers" coming out party against the Boston Braves. The New York Yankees fire their first challenge at the Athletics in Philadelphia, while the St. Louis Cardinals, world champions, make their first home stand against the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Washington and Boston, after entertaining the presidential party, journey to the hub for another ceremonial affair Tuesday. The other American league engagements Tuesday are: Cleveland at Detroit, St. Louis at Chicago; national league, Philadelphia at New York; Chicago at Cincinnati.
