in one of the most formidable natural fortifications in the world, the Modoc held off the military forces and many tragic events occurred in and about that rugged region until they were finally driven from their stronghold and in scattered bands were picked up in detail.

The first investment of the stronghold occurred on Jan. 17, 1873 and although forty-one men were lost in the efforts, they failed to dislodge the enemy.

The massacre of the peace commission, resulting in the death of General E. R. S. Canby and Rev. Eleazer Thomas, and serious wounding of Col. A. B. Meacham, occurred on April 11, 1873. At this point a marker has been erected in honor of Gen. Canby and many others who lost their lives in this final struggle with the redmen of the region.

April 26, 1873 occurred the defeat of the command of Capt. Evan Thomas, consisting of about eighty men who were surprised at the Sand Hills, four miles south of the stronghold, while making reconnaissance and twenty-two men were killed and nineteen wounded.

A number of minor engagements occurred, the last on March 12 at Dry Lake, in which the Modocs were defeated by the soldiers; and soon after, the surrender of the band occurred.

Capt. Jack himself surrendered with a remnant of his band June 6, 1873, at Willow Creek canyon, east of Clear Lake, and the tragedy of the Modoc was terminated by the execution of Captain Jack, Sconchin John, Black Jim and Boston Charley at Fort Klamath, Oct. 8, 1873 for the murder of the peace commission.

This article would be too long to mention the various important events which have marked the advance of civilization and development in the Klamath region from the beginning of white settlement in 1867; to the entrance of the Southern Pacific railroad in 1914, the wonderful transformation due to the reclamation program and other agencies which are contributing to the awakening of an empire, with event yet untold possibilities of development.

STUDENT LEADER QUESTIONS NEED WARS SLAUGHTER

(James Frederick Green, Yale, 1932, representative of the National Student Disarmament Council, U. S. A. in an address to the World Disarmament Conference, February 2, 1932)

Must the insanity known as war be repeated within our generation at the cost of our lives? Most important, what is to be our answer to our government in case of mobilization for war? No doubt, it may be considered unwise, even impertinent, to raise these issues, yet I would be playing traitor to my constituency were I to remain silent.

Perhaps students may rush in where diplomats fear to tread.

After contemplating the events preceding the catastrophe of 1914 we remain unconvinced as to the wisdom of our predecessors. Fourteen years after the Armistice the glamor and heroism of this period fall to languish, as even when inscribed in gilt on stone memorials. The awards have lost their brilliance, the helmets and shiny buttons are tarnished. In fact, the whole glorious temple of Mars has crumbled into ashes.

We respect our noble war dead, but we question the judgment of those responsible for their death.

Organized slaughter, we realize, does not settle a dispute; it merely silences an argument. We insist that for violence be substituted juridical control through the World Court and executive action through the League of Nations. If we are to evolve an international order out of anarchy, we must renounce nationalism and drastically curtail the absolute
