

PRODUCE MARKET OPENS NEW WEEK WITHOUT CHANGE

PORTLAND, April 11.—(AP)—There was practically no change in the general market situation for butter at the week's opening. Demand increased in a retail way which took care of practically all of the surplus. Trading in the egg market was generally without quotable change during the Monday activities.

Cheese trade appears to be marking time. Locally the last cut of one cent in the price at Tillamook appears to have stimulated buying, but weather conditions are much of a factor in forcing this increase.

In the live chicken market general prices offered by killers were unchanged for the week's opening. The extreme lowness of springs here, which are down 12c compared with a much higher price in California.

Another carload of Los Angeles strawberries is due to arrive here Tuesday morning and will again be priced around \$1.75 per crate of 12 baskets. Market is doing better in the south.

NEW YORK, April 11.—(AP)—Further liquidation beset the stock market today and final prices and leading issues were \$1 to more than \$5 lower. A rally in the afternoon apparently promoted by a rise in the wheat market, failed to hold, and the list slumped again late.

A steady decline in the morning and early afternoon broke most pivotal stocks through last week's lows. Later, some short covering was prompted by wheat's advance of more than 3 cents a bushel and by rumors that the federal government planned to co-operate with banking circles in efforts to halt security selling, but this improvement was short-lived and closing prices were around the day's lows.

Transactions totaled less than 2,000,000 shares.
