### MICROPHONE TEST DISCLOSES 'PING' IF GASOLINE BAD

The microphone test, introduced into the petroleum industry by the Union Oil company and demonstrated here today by Earl Cooper, former champion racing car pilot, who for the past two months has been road testing Union 76 gasoline, proves that the average motor fuel develops a ping in the motor, however inaudible to the human ear it is, and may be pounding pistons, connecting rods and main bearings of the car into mechanical deficiency.

Working with one of Hollywood's sound laboratories, Union's technical engineers a few weeks ago perfected the microphone and amplifying set to be used to detect defects in engine operation. The mechanism consists essentially of a microphone mounted on the engine block and a sensitive amplifying set placed under the cowl and controlled from the steering post. It can be regulated to magnify several hundred times the actual noise of the engine. The set is installed in Cooper's test car, a new 12-cylinder Auburn.

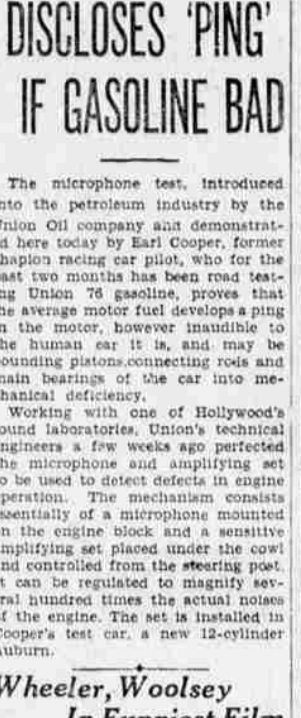
### NEW EVIDENCE IN REED CASE CLAIM

Counsel for Albert W. Reed, serving a life term in state prison for conviction of complicity in the slaying of Victor Knott, Ashland policeman, last winter, report discovery of new evidence tending to show that the tire tracks of an auto found near the murder spot do not correspond to the tires found on Reed's car when it was wrecked near Poots creek the morning after the killing.

This discovery was not embodied in the motion for a new trial filed last Friday. Gus Newbury, senior counsel for Reed, holds this new angle is "highly important."

The motion for a new trial alleges misconduct on the part of a woman juror, discovery of evidence corroborating Reed's own story of his movements before and after the slaying, and attacks the credibility of Roy Laymon, policeman, who positively identified Reed as the killer.

### NEW TRIAL PLEAS IN TRIO OF CASES WILL BE ARGUED

Motions for new trials in three cases originating in this county and which claimed a large share of public interest, will probably be argued next week when Circuit Judge H. D. Norton returns from Josephine county, where he is holding court this week. Earl H. Fehl, editor of the Pacific Record-Herald, against whom a jury returned a verdict awarding \$15,000 damages in a libel suit of Roy Parr, game warden; Prof. C. Engelhardt of the Eagle Point district, found guilty and fined \$200, and Albert W. Reed, Denver, Colo., now serving a life sentence in state prison for complicity in the murder of Victor Knott, Ashland policeman, last November, all seek new hearings.

Each case has numerous affidavits, alleging misconduct of jurors. Prof. C. Engelhardt alleges in affidavits that Jurymen George Tretchler and B. J. Palmer manifested prejudice, and Editor Fehl and Reed present documents alleging misconduct on the part of Mrs. Myrtle GeBauer, Medford, a juryswoman in both trials. A score of affidavits have been filed in Fehl's behalf, nine for Reed and four for Prof. Engelhardt.

In each case the state or opposing counsel will file counter affidavits, to contest the granting of the new trials sought.
