

HIGH SCHOOL BAND LEAVES FRIDAY TO PLAY IN CONTEST

With a record unequalled by any other high school in Oregon, Medford high school's band, under the direction of F. Wilson Watt, will participate for the eighth consecutive time in the state band contest at Corvallis Friday.

The contest is being sponsored by Kappa Kappa Psi of Oregon State college.

Participation in the event comes as the reward for months of preparation, and every effort is being made to insure a high rating. The band has been treated this year in high school as a subject, rather than an activity, and an hour of practice is spent each day. F. Wilson Watt is the director.

The band members will take the trip this year in private cars, leaving Medford Friday morning and returning Sunday. The contest takes place Saturday afternoon. The students will stay for the week-end at fraternity houses. About ten bands are expected to enter and are divided into classes A, B and C, in accordance with the size of the school they represent. Medford high school band will enter class A.

Each band is required to play three numbers at the contest, a warm-up number, "Haywood," the overture from "The Queen's Secret," by Thomas, and a number selected by each entrant. The Medford band will play either "The Western World," a march by Price, or "The Gladiators March," by the late John Philip Sousa, as its warm-up piece, and "Intermezzo" from the L'Arlesienne suite, by Bizet, as its selected number.

An active program is being carried out by the band in the form of presentations before schools, theaters and civic organizations of Medford, and a special benefit assembly will be held in the senior high school auditorium tomorrow at 1 p. m., to finance the contest trip.

A varied program of vaudeville acts will be presented and the public is cordially invited. Also for the benefit of the band, the local Oregon State College club will sponsor a card party at the senior high school in the girls' gymnasium, tonight at 7:45 o'clock. The band will appear in a short concert.

950 JAPANESE ON DANGERED VESSEL

TOKYO, April 12.—(AP)—A dispatch to the Hengo news agency from Hakodate, Japan, today said the steamer Taisei Maru No. 3, carrying 950 Japanese men and women workers to the fisheries and canneries of the northern sea for the summer season was grounded on the rocks of Murakami bay, on Paramushiru island in the northern Kuriles.

The ship also carries 31 men in its crew. An SOS call brought the Otaru Maru and the Taisei Maru No. 1 to the scene but the high seas thus far have prevented a rescue.

He spent 14 years of painstaking research on his work "Lee, the American," and his "The Soul of Samuel Pepys" brought him international recognition.
