

PRESBYTERY OF SO. W. OREGON IN ANNUAL SESSION

Grants Pass Scene Of Gathering—Rev. Muirden Of Roseburg Chosen New Moderator, Reports Heard

Last yesterday afternoon, at Grants Pass, the Presbytery of southwestern Oregon closed its annual spring meeting, adjourning to meet in July at Albany college in connection with the annual meeting of Synod, the state organization of the Presbyterian churches of Oregon.

The Grants Pass meeting began Tuesday evening with a good attendance of ministers and elders from over the Presbytery, which includes churches at Klamath Falls, Merrill, Malin and Lakeview and as far west and north as Gold Beach, Dandon, Marshfield, North Bend, Reedsport, Roseburg, Oakland and Sutherlin and other intermediate points.

The Medford church was represented by Elder Carl J. Broumner, Others attending from the valley were Mr. and Mrs. Henry W. Frame, and Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Hartley of Phoenix; Rev. S. H. Jones of Jacksonville; J. M. Johnson of Central Point; J. B. Smith of Hattie Falls and Eagle Point; Mr. and Mrs. S. E. Harris of Rogue River and E. Iverson of Medford.

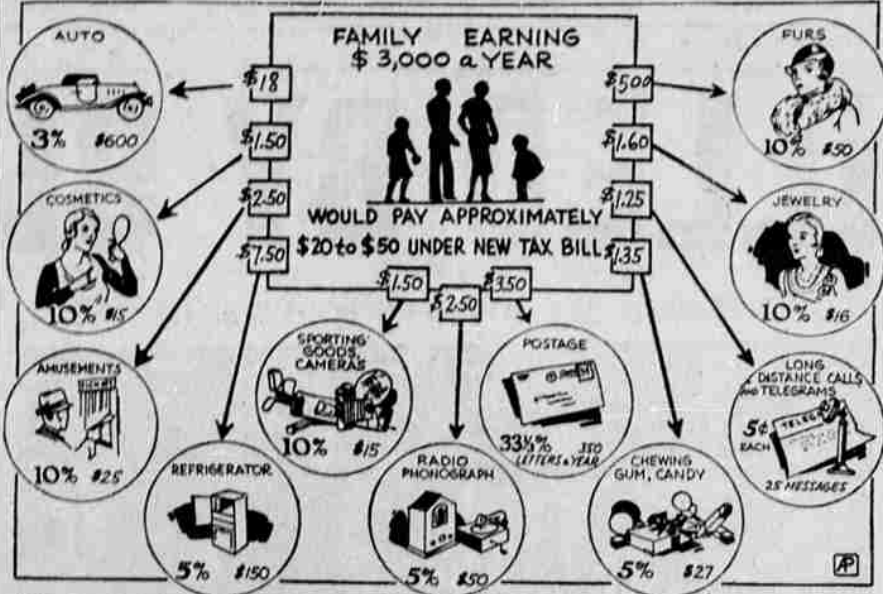

Spilve of Medford; Program and Field Activities, Rev. Thos. Robinson of Oakland; Yarns and Supply, Rev. D. T. Robertson of Marshfield; County and Inter-church Activities, Rev. E. V. Ostrander of Myrtle Point.

The place for the fall meeting of the presbytery in September will be arranged at the adjourned meeting at Albany in July. Intimation was given that it may be at Central Point.

Depending on the purchase, the family earning \$3,000 would pay from \$20 to \$50 in new taxes in a year.

ANGLERS PREPARE TO CATCH TROUT ON OPENING DAY

A fishing they will go—all of Medford's anglers, would-be anglers, and prospective anglers, tomorrow and tomorrow—for the trout season opens Friday and all sportsmen, who can't leave business for the opening day will be wading the Rogue Saturday and Sunday, if talk is any indication of fact.

While there are many trout in the streams the water is still so deep from melting snows that fishing will be done in many instances with great difficulty.

Bait and spinners promise to be the most effective, and most generally used, lures. The popularity of the fly will increase as the streams return to normal level. Evans creek will be one of the

best streams for early fishing, local fishermen state. The Little Butte will also be a favored haunt, and the Rogue, as always.

Fish lake will be unapproachable because of snows on the opening day, and it is highly improbable that anyone will venture to Hiatt prairie.

Any stream which is not fed by snow waters will offer good fishing. Although the Oregonian recently ran an illustration of steelhead fishing in the Rogue, the river has not been open to steelhead fishing during the winter. The steelhead now in the river are no good, poor and enroute to the ocean, the anglers claim.

The season next year will be open from April 15 to February 1, according to decision of the game commission. It is hoped here that anglers in the north will not take the Oregonian picture seriously and plan to do any steelhead fishing, as the fresh run will not be on in the Rogue until June.

The veteran anglers start out in search of them with the fly for lure the first Sunday after July 4.

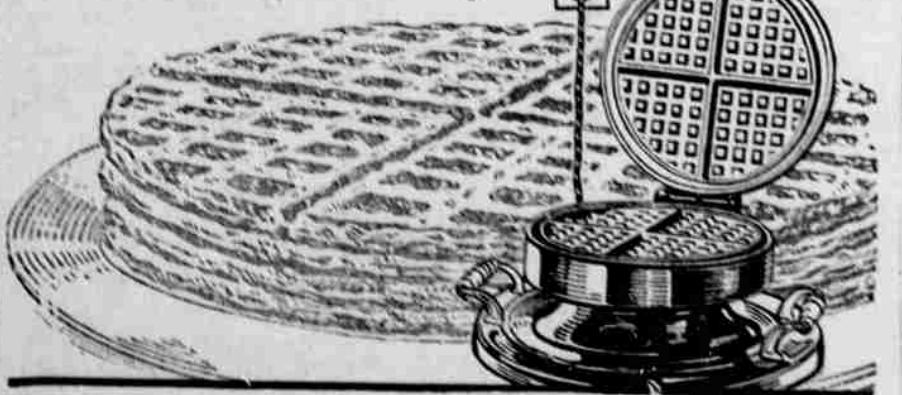
