

### VOTING MACHINERY OF COUNTY OILED FOR MAY PRIMARY

Ballots for the May 20 primary are in course of preparation by the county clerk's office, and will be ready for printing early next week.

The county court yesterday signed an order directing that the clerk place a special issue on the ballot for the Foothill precinct, so the voters there can decide whether or not stock shall run at large in the area tributary to Riveria. Petitions for the actions were freely signed by residents of the district. One side holds that cows have a right to roam when and where they please; the other that they dot the highway, instead of the landscape, and leave a bad impression with the tourists.

The county court also issued an order for the county clerk to open the sealed ballot boxes used in the 1930 election, destroy the contents and use the ballot boxes in the coming primary.

The sheriff's office is selecting the polling places for the primary, which will be the same as two years ago, as far as possible. Three or four changes will be made in this city's voting precinct.

The Oakdale precinct polling place will be moved from the Oakdale store to the senior high school; the North Main precinct will be changed from Fichtner's Garage to the Hotel Holland across the street, and the Newtown precinct, formerly in the Washington school, to a vacant house, not yet selected.

It is also probable that the South Main precinct will be moved to the basement of the public library, if arrangements can be made.

The following officers will be nominated at the primary by the Democrat and Republican parties: Five presidential and vice-presidential electors, United States senator, congressman from first district, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, two members of the legislature, and a district attorney on the state ballot.

On the county ticket, each party will nominate a county judge, county commissioner, assessor, treasurer, school superintendent, coroner, justice of the peace in the Medford, Ashland and Gold Hill districts, constables for each of the judicial districts, and a central committeeman from each precinct.

The Republican and Democrat parties each will nominate seven delegates at large to the national convention, and two each, who are not at large.

The election will be held Friday, May 20, and the polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

### YOUTH CHARGED WITH THROWING ACID OVER DOG

George Higgins, a junior high school student, is scheduled to appear before the juvenile court tomorrow to answer to the charge of throwing acid on a dog belonging to Charles Rose, Spring street, this city.

Young Higgins, according to the sheriff, admitted throwing the acid and told a frank story of the incident. Both Sheriff Jennings and County Judge Lamkin believe that the act was committed thoughtlessly and not maliciously.

According to the youth, he obtained the sulphuric acid through upon the dog from the junior high laboratory where it was used in making tests in the chemical classes. He says that he dog chased little chickens in his yard and he threw the acid upon the animal thinking it "would tickle him up and he would go home." Instead the fiery fluid burned the hide and hair off the rear portions of the dog.

Young Higgins was detained late yesterday and allowed to go on his own recognizance pending the hearing.

County Judge Lamkin and Sheriff Jennings investigated the case. At the home of one suspect Judge Lamkin took a severe test. It was figured that acid had been thrown from an auto battery. Judge Lamkin stuck his finger in the battery and did not lose his finger, or finger nail, proving it was not strong enough to take the hair off the dog.

By using sawdust and wood waste the county court is helping the local industry as there has always been more sawdust and wood waste produced in Jackson county than the demand in the territory for this type of fuel has required.

Sawdust can be used to great advantage in heating hotels, laundries, office buildings, and even small dwellings wherever a furnace is installed. ### HEAVY SNOWS WILL FEED IRRIGATION IN ENSUING SUMMER

Water Master Fred N. Cummins reports 84 inches of snow at Four-Mile lake, 37 inches at Fish lake and 24 inches at Hiatt Prairie, as a source of supply for the three leading irrigation reservoirs of this section. The Emigrant Dam reservoir is full to overflowing.

There has been no general melting of snow at Fish lake, Four-Mile lake or Hiatt prairie. The warm days of late April and May will start the thaw and once started it will proceed rapidly.

The soil on farm and orchard is in good condition now, with ample moisture retained. Farmers have about completed their spring seeding and would like a gentle rain. It would be nice, but is not imperative.

Last year plans were made to start irrigation waters May 1, on a restricted basis, with the reservoirs from a third to a half full. This year the irrigation water will not be needed before mid-June or early in July.

There is a heavy flow at present in all rivers and streams.

### SPARROW PARK PLAN FAVORED

Sentiment favors establishment of a memorial parkway between the Crater national forest boundary and Prospect, along the Crater Lake highway, honoring the late County Judge Alex Sparrow, according to C. T. Baker, secretary of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, who has been in touch with state officials during the past week.

Secretary Baker was informed Governor Julius Meier is favorable to the idea and that a group of state officials will be in Medford soon to further discuss the plan. Under the arrangement, trees for a distance of several hundred yards in either side of the highway will be protected against the operations of loggers, preserving the scenic value of this approach road to Crater lake for years to come, and also honoring a man who for seven years was superintendent of Crater Lake national park.
