

# Attractive New Valentine Cafe to Celebrate Opening Saturday

## DINERS WILL SEE TRANSFORMATION IN POPULAR CAFE

For the past seven years it has been known as the Club cafe, and in appearance it was just an ordinary place where one could get unusually good food. Tomorrow, Saturday, its doors—new ones at that—will be officially opened and diners at "Valentine's Cafe" will see a complete transformation.

The entrance to "Jimmy" Valentine's new cafe is marked by an attractive tile approach, and colorful awnings as well as a large Neon sign make it evident that the Club cafe has been rejuvenated.

Two office rooms which adjoined the former dining room on the south, have been added to the floor space and are now occupied by a fine horse-shoe lunch counter and fountain with 27 comfortable stools. Philippine mahogany was used for fixtures throughout the establishment. The walls are finished in ivory and light brown shades, contrasting beautifully with the dark furniture and floor covering.

Two wide, curved archways separate the main dining room with its 16 booths, from the adjoining lunch and fountain section. Tapestry cushion seats add another note of color and comfort to the individual Philippine mahogany booths.

With the completion of the extensive remodeling and expansion, Valentine's cafe is now undoubtedly one of the most modern restaurants in this part of the state. Its location on South Riverside avenue has always been very advantageous in attracting tourists. Mr. Valentine stated. And with all the new improvements he anticipates even greater success in the future.

### SOUTHERN OREGON SHEEP LOSS HIGH

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 15.—(AP)—Spring activities in Oregon sheep industry are in full swing with the Willamette valley growers marketing some of their new crop lambs. According to a review by the U. S. department of agricultural economics and the Oregon State college extension service. The lambing season is under way in eastern Oregon and growers in some of the southern

counties are moving their bands to the early mountain ranges. The lamb crop in the valley flocks was heavy, but information coming from range section east of the Cascades and in southern Oregon indicates more than a normal loss of lambs and considerable loss of ewes due to severe winter and poor quality feed.
