DR. ALDRICH TELLS OF ORCHARD AIMS AT KIWANIS CLUB

Dr. Wm. Aldrich of the government experimental orchard acquainted members of the Kiwanis club with the type of work being done at the orchard in an address at the regular club luncheon at the Hotel Medford today noon.

The government's aim, he pointed out, is to help the pear grower make more money by reducing his production costs. Experiments are being made to show the value of water in the production of more and larger fruit.

Trees, as people, Dr. Aldrich pointed out, need water. The experiment work carried on at the orchard near this city will determine the best time for applying the water to the trees in view of better fruit, he stated.

The benefits to be derived by local business men through the production of fruit at lower costs, was emphasized to the club members by the speaker in conclusion.

Olin Arnsperger of the Talent and Medford irrigation districts expressed his appreciation of the information being brought to growers and irrigation district heads by the governmental experimentation. E. G. Fowler, county agent, also added a word of appreciation of Dr. Aldrich's work and instructive talk.
