

FINAL REGISTRY RUSH ON TODAY HIGH MARK NEAR

Final rush of voters to register for the May 20 primary was underway today in the clerk's office with prospects that the Jackson county registration would approach the 18,000 mark—the largest in local history.

More than 1000 registration cards were received Monday, bringing the total well past the 17,000 mark. Included in the registrations are several hundred women voters, many of whom have not voted since 1916—the year they were kept out of war by the Democratic presidential nominee.

HUNT FOR BODIES WAITING WEATHER

As soon as the weather settles in the mountains a corner-sheriff posse will be organized for a search in the Dead Indian country for the bodies of Edwin C. Brown and wife, homesteaders who lost their lives during a blizzard last January.

The cost of the new search will be borne by the county and it will be away from habitations. The Brown's are now thought to have wandered far and lie in a deep snow drift, in the rough and heavily timbered country.

TEACHER AND PUPILS TOGETHER AGAIN AS POLITICAL POT BOILS

"We'll tell no tales out of school," pipe three candidates from this year's political pot—A. J. Hanby, Edward C. Kelly and Frank Perl. And the last two named hope that Professor Hanby won't, or at least that he has forgotten.

Professor Hanby, who seeks the Republican nomination for county school superintendent, was the teacher. Mr. Kelly, candidate for the Democratic nomination for state representative, and Frank Perl, who seeks the Republican nomination for county coroner, the pupils.

No mention was made by Professor Hanby at the Central Point gathering of the frequency with which his proteges decked the Medford dance stools, long before political ambitions surged through their veins. His former scholars were present. And it is understood today that whenever Professor Hanby is invited to speak, there Kelly and Perl will be also.

THIEVES REMOVE LIGHTING MOTOR IN RURAL SCHOOL

EVANS VALLEY, Ore., April 19.—(Sp.)—School was resumed here today after closing Friday morning when it was discovered the Delco power plant motor, generating light for the school, and also pumping water, had been stolen between midnight and 6:30 o'clock that morning.

An emergency motor was obtained and installed over the week-end. Thieves who tore the locks from the pump house, cut the wires leading to the school, then removed the motor, valued at \$150. They also drained about 35 gallons of gasoline from the storage tank, by digging a hole about five feet deep near the tank, to siphon it out by means of a hose.

A window to the school house was pried open and 143 pencils were taken, according to state police officers who investigated the case. A number of tools belonging to Mr. Cochran were also taken from the school house.

Numerous thefts have been reported in Evans Valley this spring. Gasoline was drained from all of the county trucks stationed in a farmyard here one night.

The lock on one of the garage doors belonging to Jack Steward was removed Sunday night, but no valuables had been left there by him, so nothing was missed.

O-C TAX REFUND HELPS TREASURY JACKSON COUNTY

Jackson county the past week has received new financial tonic in the shape of a treasury department check for \$92,938.79—the 1931 payment of the Oregon-California tax refund. Coupled with steady payment of current taxes—twice the amount of last year—the money horizon of the county has taken on a slightly rosier hue.

The Oregon-California tax refund, previously budgeted, has been appropriated by the treasurer's office to the various funds as follows: General fund \$57,714.47 Special road 13,178.83 School 22,088.11 Jacksonville 7.38

Checks for the school and road districts were mailed Monday by the county treasurer to the various districts. The Jacksonville payment is on a special claim.

According to the tax collection department of the sheriff's office, more than \$11,000 was "turned over" to the treasurer last week. This is better than average current tax payments of the past two years. The period for paying the first half tax, expires May 5.

First-half payments of the Southern Pacific, the California-Oregon Power company and other corporations within the county, are generally made after May 1.

DEPOSITORS GIVEN WORD ON WAIVERS

Former depositors of the Jackson County bank have received formal notice of the sums waived, which they will share pro rata in the proceeds realized from the collection of "assets in the sum of \$305,895.85, now held in trust by the First National bank of this city. Realization of some of the assets is now underway. The period of liquidation is problematical, and dependent somewhat upon crop conditions and clearing of the economic scene.

The letters are signed by C. W. McDonald, as president of the Jackson County bank, and appreciation is expressed for the cooperation of depositors shown in the closing of the active business of the bank.

4 PERCENT BEER ACT DISAPPROVED BY SENATE GROUP

(Continued from Page One) substitution of government regulation.

Among the spectators were Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, and Rufus Lusk of the Crusaders, anti-prohibition organization. Hoosier prohibition as a "Pharisee, Mohammedan, Mormon, Methodist doctrine."

"If the honest leaders of prohibition," he said, "and I eliminate the mercenaries and ecclesiastical politicians—would only get together with the forces of temperance and permit the world temperance to be written into the compact, the question might easily be solved."

Blamed for Crime Wave. He said prohibition is "pagan" and temperance is "Christian," and held the 18th amendment responsible for the "crime wave."

Labor's national committee for modification of the Volstead act, through John P. Colpy, then advocated 2.75 per cent beer.

The committee is headed by Matthew Well, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor.

Colpy said legalizing 2.75 per cent beer would put 300,000 men to work within three months.

"I have never seen one who has been prominent in advocacy of this law who is not a hypocrite of the first water," Colpy asserted.

Opponents of prohibition applauded.

FEHL ARGUMENT FOR NEW TRIAL COMES UP SOON

Arguments on the plea of the Pacific Record Herald and its editor, Earl H. Fehl, for a new trial in the libel suit wherein Roy Farr, game warden, Ashland, was given a \$15,000 verdict, are scheduled to be made the latter part of the week—no definite date being yet named. The court desires to clear the present docket of three or four minor matters.

A score of affidavits and counter-affidavits have been filed by plaintiff and defendant in the case. The defense affidavits are chiefly centered around allegations of prejudice and misconduct of members of the trial jury, and alleged statements of Mrs. Myrtle GeBauer, a jurymen, of this city.

The court is scheduled to hear arguments, the week-end, in the plea of Prof. C. Englehardt of Eagle Point, sentenced to pay a fine of \$250 upon conviction of assault and battery upon John Domingala. Prof. Englehardt, through his attorney also alleges prejudice on the part of two jurors—B. J. Palmer and George Trechler, and files affidavits in support of his contention.

Hearings on the plea of Albert W. Reed, serving life in Salem prison for complicity in the slaying of Victor Knott, Ashland policeman, is expected to be scheduled within the next two weeks. The state yesterday was granted an additional five days in which to prepare and file affidavits controverting those presented by the defense.

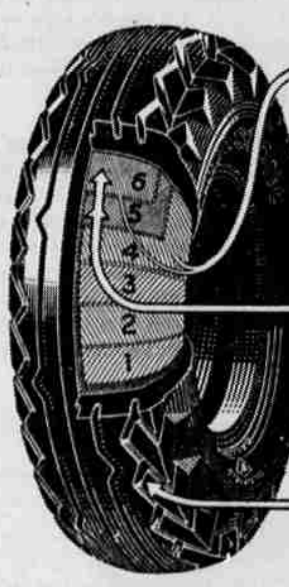
