Other Investments Bad Too. "Did the concerns turn out successfully?" he was asked.

"Not the ones I invested in," was the reply. Elliott said that Keller had been sold by O. P. Coshow, then president, that stock could not be exchanged as had been proposed to him by Keller, and that Coshow "did not see why he (Keller) had made such representation."

Elliott said he had first purchased two shares, paying cash. Ten days later he subscribed for 80 more, paying \$1250 and giving a note for the balance. He was told by Ralph Watson, salesman, that Westerner stock had been sold for \$32 or \$32.50 a share, but that some could be "picked up" in Salt Lake City not to exceed \$25 a share.

Elliott said he believed Hagerty of Newberg to be president of the casualty company, a subsidiary of the Empire concern, and when shown a letter in the prospectus signed by Hagerty to the effect that Hagerty had decided to accept the position, the statement meant the same thing to him.
