BUTTE FALLS, Ore., April 21.—(Sp.)—Mrs. George Stewart has returned from Eugene, where she was called by the illness of her husband.

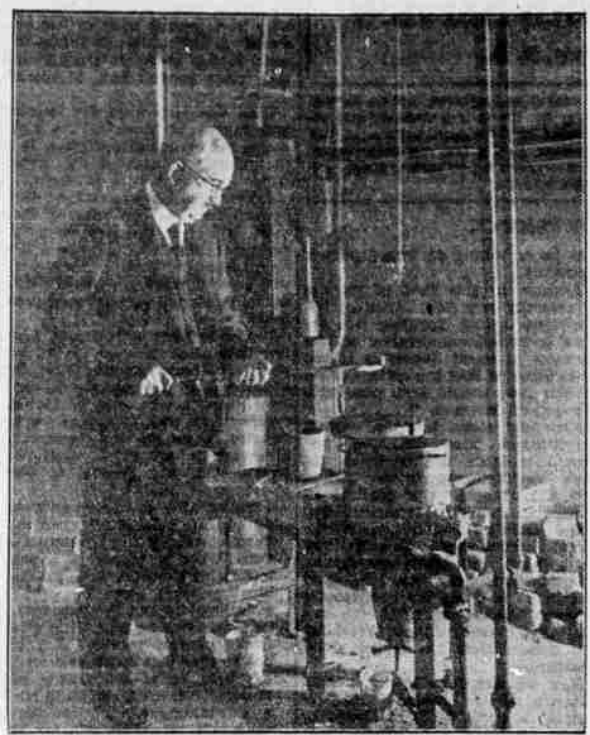
Mrs. B. F. Hilkey returned Saturday from Willows, Cal., with her son, Howard, who is recovering from an appendicitis operation.

HOSIERY PEDDLER AND ASHLAND LAD GIVEN PEN TERMS

James Markwood, 21, a silk hose salesman from Ohio, who served a term in the state reformatory at Monroe, Wash., was sentenced by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton late yesterday to serve three years in state prison on a guilty plea to burglary.

Dean Booth, 21, of Ashland, a bridegroom of seven months, who confessed to 98 robberies in Ashland and this city the past winter, was sentenced to serve four years in state prison. His wife, whose kin reside in the Talent district, was given a six months suspended sentence on condition that she mind her mother, refrain from ill companionship and the bad influence of her husband.

The couple, in confessions to the state police, admitted wholesale thievery, one unit of loot being 3000 shingles piled on an Ashland street curb.

Markwood pleaded poverty as the reason for his crime, claiming that the proceeds of his thefts were sent to Ohio to support his mother and sister. He was arrested in this city two weeks ago, following a series of house robberies. His method was to knock at a residence door, with a sample case of hose. If the knock was unanswered he entered and stole money. He was caught in the act of looting the Lee Simpson home, by the little daughter of the house, who spread the alarm.

The court administered stern lectures to both defendants and the girl wife. Both pleaded depression-bred poverty as the cause of their derelictions.

FEHL AUGMENT SLATED FRIDAY

Arguments on a motion for a new trial for the Pacific Record Herald and its editor, Karl H. Fehl, contesting the \$15,000 libel award against it in favor of Roy Parr, Ashland, game warden, will be heard by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton tomorrow morning.

This morning the court heard arguments of Fehl's attorneys to make more definite and certain the mortgage foreclosure proceeding of Niedermeyer, Inc. The plaintiff avers that a \$14,000 mortgage against the publishing company and Fehl holds precedence over the \$15,000 libel suit award upon which judgment was executed.

Fehl was represented by Attorneys Herbert Hanna and E. E. Kelly, the session being devoted largely to technical points of law.
