

SCHOOL ATHLETES OF COUNTY TO VIE HERE TOMORROW

Teachers and Normal Students Will Act As Judges—Events Will Open at 8:30 On All-Day Program

Everything is in readiness for the southern Oregon track and field meet at the county fairgrounds, to be held tomorrow, under the supervision of Albert Fish of the local junior high school.

The grounds have been prepared for the events, which open at 8:30 a. m. with volleyball games. Judges will include teachers from the various schools in the county, and a group of boys from the Southern Oregon Normal school will also assist in conducting the events.

According to the program issued today, the 800-yard run will be called at 9:30 for the town schools' class C boys, followed by the 50-yard dash for several classes, concluding with the 100-yard dash for class C boys.

Pole Vault in Morning. Following the dashes are the 120-yard hurdles for boys and 80-yard hurdles for girls, in the town school group. Pole vaulting for rural school boys is posted next, and running high girls from rural schools. The 100-ing in the town school listings.

For the rural schools, running broad jump, flag race and baseball throw will be held for boys and girls, after which the town representatives among the boys will participate in the running broad jump, pole vault and running high jump. Town girls are listed for the 75-yard dash in the various classes.

Next on the morning program for the rural boys are the running broad jump, hop-step-and-jump, and running high jump. The rural girls then compete in the 75-yard dash.

Running high jump, running broad jump and the pole vault for town boys complete the forenoon program. The rural events are to be concluded before 12 o'clock with chinning for various classes, and a potato race for class A girls.

P. T. A. to Serve Lunch. In keeping with their annual custom, members of the Bellview Parents-Teachers' association will serve luncheon at noon, they have announced.

Events during the afternoon open at 1:15, according to the program, with the 50-yard dash for boys and out according to enrollment, with A, yard dash and the 220-yard run for town schools come next, with 100-yard dash and 220-yard runs for the rural students.

Shot puts are booked for both town and rural boys, with a sack race in the latter group for class A, and javelin throwing for the town contestants.

Ten Town Teams in Relay. In the relays, 10 town teams are listed for the 440-yard, with the four best men to a team, each to run 110 yards. The 220-yard relay for the 10 teams will be conducted by the four best girls to a team, each to run 35 yards. The same listing has also been made for rural participants.

County school superintendent's office has announced the colors for each of the town schools as follows: Butte Falls, green; Central Point, red; Gold Hill, white; Jacksonville, pink; Phoenix, blue; Prospect, brown; Rogue River, yellow; Sams Valley, gray; Talent, orange; Eagle Point, purple.

Designations have been worked out according to enrollment, with A, B and C in the towns, and A and B for the rural. The four silver loving cups will be awarded by the Rotary, Kiwanis and Active clubs of Medford, and the Rotary club of Ashland.

Points to determine the winners of the trophies will be figured with three for the towns and five for rural schools.

The number of contestants participating will not be known until tomorrow morning, Mr. Fish said today.
