## OREGON BUILDING PERMITS REFLECT BUSINESS UPTURN

Showing a decided increase over last year, building permits in Oregon during March, 1932, totaled \$2,405,871, in comparison with March, 1931, figures, which were \$733,662, according to a report issued by the National Monthly building survey.

With the other leading cities in the state, Medford compares favorably. Permits here the past month were \$4935, while last year they were \$125,800. In February, 1932, city building amounted to \$7235. The amount here last year was swelled by a school permit.

Portland's building activity of March increased over three times during the comparative period last year. Last month the state metropolis issued permits amounting to \$2,319,615, while last year they were \$677,750.
