

# Shady Cove and Oak Grove School Athletes Win Track Meet Cups

## LARGER SCHOOLS' MEET POSTPONED ACCOUNT DELUGE

### 150 Students Participate, Despite Muddy Condition—Shady Cove Also Winner in Volley Ball Game

In the rural school division of the county track meet conducted yesterday at the Jackson county fair grounds, Shady Cove won the trophy donated by the Ashland Rotary club for one and two-room schools with 31 points. The record Athletic cup for three and four-room schools went to Oak Grove, with 86 points.

Events for town schools, which include rural high schools, were postponed yesterday because of weather conditions, according to Albert Fitch, chairman of the track and field meet. He stated that they would probably be conducted April 30 or May 7.

**West Side Leads**  
Winning in the one and two-room school groups gave West Side school 19, Reese Creek 15, Bellview 8, Neil Creek 8 and Missouri Flat 6.

**Second place in the three and four-room schools went to Howard with 40 points.** Other ratings were Evans Valley 38 and Laurelhurst 13. About 150 students from twenty schools participated in the annual field contests, and although the weather conditions were not ideal, a large number of spectators were in the grandstands. Lunch was served there at noon by the Bellview P.-T. A.

In each event blue, red and white ribbons were given winners of first, second and third places, respectively. Shady Cove won the volley ball game from Howard school, 19 to 10.
