

### CLEVER FARCE AT ST. MARK'S HALL TO OPEN TONIGHT

The first Medford performance of "Bless the Little Heart," clever three act farce, will open tonight at St. Mark's Guild hall at 8:15 o'clock. Directed by Tom Swann, and featuring a cast of local players, whose theatrical ability is lauded by all who have viewed their work in past undertakings and recent rehearsals, the play promises Medford and all other valley folk a rare treat in stage comedy.

The plot is crammed with humorous situations and moves rapidly along through the interpretation of the Medford cast. There are no dull moments, no serious moments, no thought demanding moments, but a series of laugh promoting incidents. Tickets have been on sale for several days and can be purchased at the doors tonight. Photographs of the players have been on display, inviting additional followers of little theater undertakings to view this, the first production in several months by the Guild players.

Sponsored by the St. Mark's Altar Guild the arrangements for the play have been in charge of Mrs. Porter J. Neff and Mrs. Royal E. Bebb. The cast includes the following players: Edith Stevens, who plays the role of the philanthropic aunt; Lois Pearson, formerly with the Santa Barbara Community theater, cast as an "actress"; Elbow Mae Wilson, "a successful interior decorator," whose lovely voice aids her also in playing the charming mother; Fletcher Flah, a favorite with local audiences for several years, appears as the retired sea captain. Harold GeBauer and Frank Van Dyke, who are constantly getting in, or getting out of, an embarrassing predicament add extra spice to the plot and its unwinding.

### VETERAN SHOOTS FATHER IN FIGHT WITH POLICEMAN

MILLEN, Ga., April 26.—(P)—A World war veteran, evading arrest for intoxication, barricaded himself in a hotel room today and killed his father as a crowd sought to entice him to surrender.

The veteran, Dave Humphrey, 38, was arrested by Policeman Carey Averett, but he wounded the officer in a fight and fled to the hotel. "I'll come out if you'll go get my father," he shouted to Sheriff Marchbach from the room which he guarded with a shotgun.

The sheriff drove five miles into the country to the home of the father, R. B. Humphrey, and took him to the hotel.

"That's not my father. You're trying to trick me," Humphrey cried. "This is Daddy. Don't you know me, Dave?" replied the father as he climbed to a balcony so his son could get a better view of him.

Dave Humphrey deliberately raised his gun and fired, killing his father. Then he refused to let officers approach the body. Finally a squad of policemen came from Augusta with tear gas bombs, tossed them into the room and subdued him.

### ROTARIANS TOLD ADVERTISING AID BUSINESS RETURN

The Rotary club at its noon meeting today listened to a talk by one of its members, C. L. MacDonald, on the subject, "Responsibility of Advertising in Business Recovery."

Mr. MacDonald stated that in times like the present advertising has a great opportunity as well as a great responsibility. To be effective it must be well directed and backed up by service, quality and appeal of merchandise. It must advertise those things that people need and want today.

"Now is the time for action in creating business of rearing instead of waiting for business to come, is recognized by leaders in many lines of industry, and advertising is the greatest mass salesman ever placed on the job," he said. "Those firms, both local and national, that are advertising aggressively are finding themselves in the best condition. Of a survey of 97 companies, nationally known, 62 increased advertising in 1930 and 35 decreased.

"While all profits were decreased in 1930, the survey showed that the group which increased advertising had a decline of only 29 per cent while the group which decreased their advertising had a loss of 85 per cent."

Visiting Rotarians at today's meeting were Roy Miller and William Bilger of Seattle. The visitors spoke of the Seattle international convention to be held in June and urged a 100 per cent attendance from this district.

### DISCOVER VICTIMS MOUNTAIN CRASH

O'Brien, Medford; J. A. O'Brien, Apple-gate; Mrs. Rose Baldwin, Ashland; Miss Maude O'Brien, Seattle; Miss Annie O'Brien, Medford. She is also survived by eight grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. She was a kind and loving mother and beloved by all who knew her. She was a member of the Southern Oregon Pioneer society. Funeral services will be conducted from the Sacred Heart Catholic church, Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Father F. W. Black officiating. Interment will take place in the Jacksonville cemetery. ### M'DONALD RETURNS FROM HIGHWAY MEET

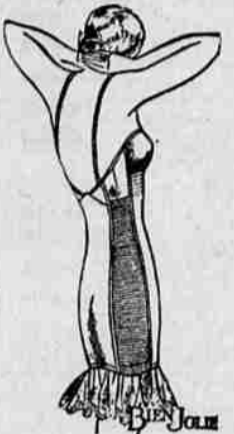

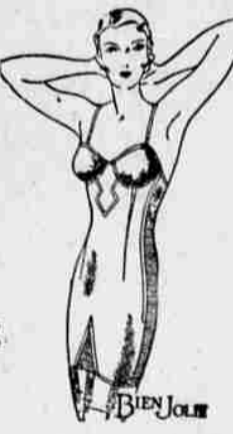
