He promises a clean-cut business administration of the office, and according to his friends, if elected he will be able to cement the factions of the Republican party, and all sections of the state, upon a program of united and constructive endeavor.

As evidence of the latter claim, it is pointed out that Scherping is receiving the support of both the Republican and Democratic newspapers in Portland, where he lives, and has for many years been one of the most prominent workers in civic and charitable fields. Scherping is a war veteran in the air service, and president of the Portland Progressive Business Men's club.

EXTORTION PAIR KILLED IN FIGHT

TAYLORVILLE, Ill., April 25.—(AP)—Henry Allegretti, 38, shot and killed two alleged extortionists in defense of a friend last night and was slain himself in the gun fight.

The shooting occurred at the home of Arthur Cioni in Langley, a nearby village, when Peter Larooca, 40, and Vincenzo Masteller, 40, both of Springfield, Ill., called with a companion to enforce, Cioni said, payment of \$1500. Allegretti, who had agreed to help Cioni in anticipation of the visit, killed Larooca with a shotgun as he advanced to the door with a machine gun. Larooca's companions opened fire and in the exchange Allegretti was killed and Masteller wounded.

RANEY SOUGHT TO ADJUST PROPERTY

Authorities in Fresno, Cal., have asked city police to assist them in locating Jack Hughes Raney, 18, in order that a settlement might be made of his estate, according to a message from the south today. Raney, who sometimes goes by the name of Jack Hughes, left Fresno October 13, 1931, according to the officers. The description of Raney gave his height as 5 feet 6 inches, weight 135 pounds, black eyes and hair, medium complexion, and one front tooth broken. Raney is said to be a mechanical worker.

GOLD HILL WILL FURNISH CEMENT FOR VETS' HOME

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 26.—(AP)—Ground was broken here Monday for the Northwest Soldiers' home upon which the federal government will spend \$2,200,000.

H. I. Stuart & Sons of Medford, who last week were awarded the grading and excavating contract, said additional equipment is expected this week to speed up the work. Approximately 22,000 yards of dirt will be moved.

Alden C. Palmer, superintendent for Murch Brothers Construction company, general contractor, said the sub-contract for forms and concrete work has been awarded to the Bath Construction company of Seattle. Contracts were awarded the Beaver-Portland Cement company of Gold Hill to furnish cement, and to Harley Johnson company of Roseburg for sand and rock.

summed up by the words: "Stop Roosevelt." The many influential Democratic leaders who still are uncommitted waited for the result from the two states to chart their course.

Overshadows G. O. P. Choosing The double engagement overshadowed a great volume of delegate choosing during the day in Republican ranks, and the one other Democratic selection of six delegates in Alaska. The Roosevelt forces count on these to swell the 267 votes which now put him out in front alone.

Sentiment of political observers has discounted the Bay State and

Keystone State results to a partial extent, opinion estimating that Smith could carry the bulk of Massachusetts' 36 delegates contest and that a majority of Pennsylvania's 76 would go to Roosevelt. But assaying the final significance of the double test was left until after a count of the votes.

All for Hoover

Republican primaries and state organizations undertook today the selection of 119 delegates: Massachusetts, 34; Pennsylvania, 76; Alaska, 2; Arkansas and South Carolina, 4 each. Pledged or not, they are counted in advance for President Hoover.

Pennsylvania Republicans dealt with the prohibition issue and the influence of the Philadelphia organization in the senatorial contest between James J. Davis and the vigorously dry marine general, Smedley D. Butler.

Many Now Listed

The Republican delegates are instructed, pledged and claimed as follows: Hoover, 448; Norris, 11; in doubt, Out of these, Joseph I. France of Maryland claims 78. Democratic delegates are instructed.
