AMOY'S CAPTURE BY COMMUNISTS HELD UNLIKELY

PEIPING, April 26—(AP)—Chinese officials at Canton have informed the United States consul there they do not believe there is any danger that Amoy will fall into the hands of the Chinese communist army, a dispatch to the United States legation here said.

The Chinese officials said three and one-half divisions of Cantonese regular troops, comprising about 20,000 men, are now advancing against the communist forces at Changchow.

LONDON, April 26—(AP)—So far as Great Britain's trade relations are concerned, Manchuria is still a part of China, Walter Runciman, president of the board of trade, intimated in the house of commons today.

SHANGHAI, April 26—(AP)—Prospects for an early resumption of the Sino-Japanese peace negotiations were brightened today.

Since the last conference on April 9, when the Chinese requested an indefinite postponement pending receipt of further instructions from their government, Sir Miles W. Lamson, British minister, has completed a new formula through which, it is hoped, an agreement settling the Shanghai conflict may be reached.
