FAVOR INCREASING INCOME TAX RATE

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(AP)—After rejecting a proposal to boost surtaxes to the war-time maximum of 65 per cent, the senate finance committee today voted an increase in all income tax rates above the levies written into the new revenue bill by the house.

The committee adopted a schedule presented by Senator Harrison, Mississippi, ranking Democrat, calling for a maximum surtax of 45 per cent instead of the 40 per cent figure carried in the house bill. Normal income rates were boosted to 3 per cent on the first \$4000 income; six per cent on the next \$4000 and 9 per cent on the income above \$8000.

DARROW PLEADS GOLDEN RULE IN HONOR SLAYING

(Continued from Page One) "How much had they (Mr. and Mrs. Maasie) to do with it all?" Darrow asked.

"I want to call your attention," he went on, "to whether there was a reason over which they had no control—Maasie's mind. I listened to Dr. Canton (prosecution witness) spinning his story in his own mind like a spider, for what he could get out of it."

Mind Affected. After describing the dance the night of September 12 immediately after which Mrs. Maasie was attacked, Darrow sought to bolster the defense contention that Maasie was insane at the moment of the killing.

"We contend," he said, "that for months Maasie's mind was affected by all that was borne upon him—grief, sorrow, trouble, day after day, week after week and month after month."

"What do you think would have happened to any one of you under the same circumstances? We judge other people by ourselves."
