

BUTTER STEADY WHILE SUPPLIES SHOW INCREASE

PORTLAND, April 28.—(AP)—Although increasing supplies of butter continue to be reflected in the Portland territory, trade conditions appear more or less steady.

Rumors are current in the trade that the co-operatives will cut the price of milk May 1. Those who say they are close to the situation, believe the result will be disruption of the entire milk marketing arrangement, with a direct effect on the butter trade structure and price.

Storage movement continues to gain along with the increasing production of butter, taking practically the entire surplus.

Selling of eggs by unattached producers at 1c or more below the prices established by the co-ops keeps the price list down generally and creates adverse business sentiment locally.

Movement of chickens to market is slowed up considerably with just sufficient demand in sight to keep the trade clear.

Spring lambs are showing a general cut in the price for country killed, this being the result of very liberal offerings.

There is some showing of weakness with slight price recession in the market for country killed calves. Receipts recently have shown an increase with practically no trading above a 6c basis for tops. Hogs are steady.

POWER OFFICIAL IMPRESSED HERE

William H. Hodge of Chicago, vice-president in charge of sales and advertising for the Byllesby Engineering and Management corporation, left yesterday for Portland after a two-day visit with local officials of the California Oregon Power company.

Mr. Hodge, who is just completing a three weeks' business trip through the middle west and Pacific coast, expressed an optimistic view of an early improvement in business conditions. Well planned advertising campaigns will aid greatly in improving business generally, which will in turn be reflected in relieving the unemployment situation, according to the Byllesby official. He was impressed with the growth of Medford since his last visit here, and predicted a bright future for this city and all southern Oregon.

Mr. Hodge stated that Chicago is making extensive preparations for the world's fair to be held in 1933, and expects to present the greatest exposition in history. The modern trend in architecture and illumination will be much in evidence, and the exhibits from all parts of the world promise to excel all previous fairs and expositions.

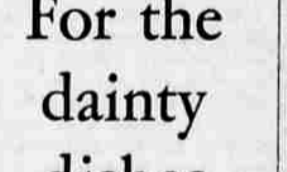
Refusal of the committee to include a tariff on lumber is believed to have had an influence in knocking out the oil and coal levies.

BANKHEAD KEEPS SEAT IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, April 28.—(AP)—The senate today declared John H. Bankhead entitled to his seat as senator from Alabama.

A last minute appeal to refuse to accept Bankhead had been made by Senator Hastings (R., Del.), chairman of the committee which investigated the charges of irregularities that had been brought by former Senator Heflin (D., Ala.)

But by 63 to 19, the senate turned Hastings down.

Bankhead held the floor for an hour and a half yesterday defending himself against charges that had been made against him in a speech of more than five hours the day before in the senate by Heflin.

PINCHOT DEPLORES LEADERSHIP LACK

MOUNT VERNON, Va., April 28.—(AP)—Gov. Clifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania, speaking at George Washington's tomb today, said Americans had lost the liberty gained by Washington, made surer by Lincoln and applied to modern problems by Roosevelt.

"But today there is no Washington to lead us against autocracy—against the suffering that goes with tyranny—against government without consent of the governed," he said. "There is no Lincoln to free modern slaves."
