FIRST AIRPLANE LANDS ON FLANK MOUNT M'KINLEY

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 28. - (Sp.) Pilot Joe Crosson was being acclaimed in Alaska today as the first man ever to set plane down on the slopes of Mt. McKinley, highest peak in North America.

He returned to Nenana, near here, yesterday, after having landed his big cabin plane on Mt. McKinley glacier, at an altitude estimated at between 6,300 and 6,500 feet.

Crosson flew Alan Carp of New York and E. P. Beck, members of an expedition which will make a study of cosmic dust on the mountain, there late Monday.

He had no more than set his plane down on the level icefield when a blizzard came up and almost swept the ship down the mountainside, he said. The men finally secured the ship and spent the night there.

They made a safe takeoff yesterday after the storm had abated and returned to Nenana where Carp and Beck will be joined Saturday by other members of the expedition. They then will be flown back to the mountain to begin their experiments.

MAIL BOX ROBBER RECEIVES PAROLE

PORTLAND, April 28. - (Sp.) - Ralph E. McCaw, 17, who admitted a federal court that he had rifled a mail box at Medford, taking a check and letter, received a parole and was placed on probation today after Federal Judge Fee had sentenced him to three years in prison and fined him \$200 on each of the two counts.

McCaw explained that after taking the check he had delivered it to the person addressed.

Waterspout Hits Racing Yacht In Australian Seas

SYDNEY, Australia. - (AP) - The crew of the "N. S. W. II," 21-foot racing yacht, narrowly escaped death when their craft was sucked up by a great waterspout off Sydney Heads.

The yachtsmen, in describing the experience, say their boat was caught in the outer edge of a great column of water which approached them over a calm sea, as low black clouds threatened heavy rain.

The yacht was whirled around and hurled upward six feet and then flung down, broken and filled with water. The crew was rescued while clinging to the remnants. The spout disappeared over the horizon.

Another recent current event film taken by the Copco camera shows the auto-gyro plane which visited Medford a short time ago as well as air views of the valley taken from this novel type of airship.

This was the first autogyro that has ever visited southern Oregon.

ASHLAND, Ky. - (AP) - The new football rules are viewed with disfavour by the Ashland high school Tomcats, unbeaten for six straight years, and untitled the last four years.

The wedge play on the kickoff, use of hands by linemen on the defense, the flying block and flying tackle, all barred by the new rules, were favorites of the Tomcats.

Coach Paul Jenkins has seven 1931 regulars and 19 reserves in a squad of 75 out for spring practice to learn the new regulations.
