

SEVEN SCHOOLS REPRESENTED IN MUSIC FESTIVAL

Seven schools of northern California and southern Oregon are represented today at the Southern Oregon Music Festival in Ashland, sponsored by the Southern Oregon Normal school, under the direction of Miss Louise Woodruff, music supervisor.

Representing California are students from Wood and Yreka. Southern Oregon schools included in the program are Rogue River, Gold Hill, Talent, Medford and Ashland, the largest representation being from this city.

The morning and afternoon programs today were attended by a large and appreciative audience. The morning was devoted to group rehearsals and interest this afternoon is centered in the singing of the combined choruses. Among them are the high school choruses of 125 voices, directed by Miss Harriett Baldwin of Medford, whose in spiring supervision shows that her musicianship tells her what effects to achieve and her training how to get them.

The girls' combined chorus, directed by Mrs. Minnie Guy, also received much favorable applause today, as did the boys' chorus under Miss Helen Kilgore's direction, the combined orchestras, led by Ward Frost of Ashland, and the combined bands, directed by F. Wilson Walt of this city.

CORONER ASSERTS DEATH A SUICIDE

Coroner H. W. Conger said today, following an investigation into the death of Mrs. Irene Ezzell yesterday, in the kitchen of her apartment in Durrell Court, 329 North Holly street, that he was satisfied suicide was the cause of death and the death certificate required by law would so state. Mrs. Ezzell was found by her daughter, Doris, when efforts to reach her by telephone failed. The gas jet of the stove was turned on full force.

No reason is known for the act. Coroner Conger said that a witness informed him today that Mrs. Ezzell contemplated suicide about a year ago and that when he called upon her relative to some stenographic work, she said: "It's a good thing you came when you did, or I would not have been here any more."
