

PHOENIX HI WINS TRACK MEET BY NARROW MARGIN

Central Point Finishes Three Points Behind Leader - Rogue River High First in Second Division.

Only three points ahead of Central Point high school, Phoenix high school finished first in division one of the Southern Oregon track and field meet conducted yesterday at the county fairgrounds, for town schools. Phoenix had 153 1/2 points and Central Point 150 1/2 points.

In the second division, Rogue River took first place with 92 points, Jacksonville second with 48 1/2, Talent third, 15 1/2 points and Gold Hill fourth, 8 1/2 points.

Places in the first division were Eagle Point third, 57; Butte Falls fourth, 34 1/2; Prospect fifth, 25, and Sams Valley sixth, 18. Cups were awarded in the two first places by the Medford Kiwanis and Medford Rotary clubs.

Albert Pritch was in charge of the meet, with Miss Clara Cumulus score keeper. Ten students from Southern Oregon Normal school assisted.

CHICAGO, April 30.—(AP)—Mickey Walker, the grownup toy bulldog of the ring, today was a little far from the heavyweight championship at 31, when most fighters are about washed up, and at a weight disadvantage of 23 pounds, Walker Friday night got up from the canvas in the Chicago stadium battle pit and slugged his way to a 10-round decision victory over King Levinsky, the pride of Chicago's Ghetto. Levinsky had been defeated before, but none of his conquerors arose from a knockdown to go on and win.

Near the end of the first round a crushing overhead right caught the Jersey Irishman on the head, and he staggered back, a looping left hook knocked him flat on his back. He didn't even take a count, but bounced to his feet and back into battle. He was so dazed, however, that he wobbled to the king's corner at the end of the session.

They were: "Whereas the foes of prohibition are engaged in an aggressive campaign looking to the repeal of both state and federal prohibition laws, and whereas the Anti-Saloon league is in peculiar way not merely the agency of the church but by official action of many of the denominations, it is the actual representative of those churches in the fight versus the liquor traffic."

"Be it further resolved that we recommend the appointment of five men and women of the Ministerial association of the city, this committee to proceed with the organization of a committee of one hundred or more citizens who shall lead the dry forces of our city in a campaign in support of the program of the Anti-Saloon league in Oregon, in defense of state and national prohibition."

Delegates to the party conventions were to be notified "Whereas the wet forces after four years of agitation have not been able to present a better plan than prohibition and whereas they now present home rule, which means return to the old conditions of state option, be it resolved that we request the delegates from our state and district to the national party convention to give their vote for enforcement rather than repeal plank (camouflaged as reabmission.)"
