CHAUFFEUR EXAM COMING UP SOON

During the first part of May applications for registration during the 1932-33 period will be mailed to all registered chauffeurs in the state.

For either an operator's or chauffeur's license since July 1, 1931, will be required to do so. They may take the application form, which they may receive through the mail, present themselves to an examiner, pass the necessary examination and the new license and badge will be issued to them.

However, any chauffeur who has taken the examination since July 1, 1931, may fill in the application form and send the same with the fee of \$1.50 to the department of state, Salem, Oregon and the license will be mailed to him.
