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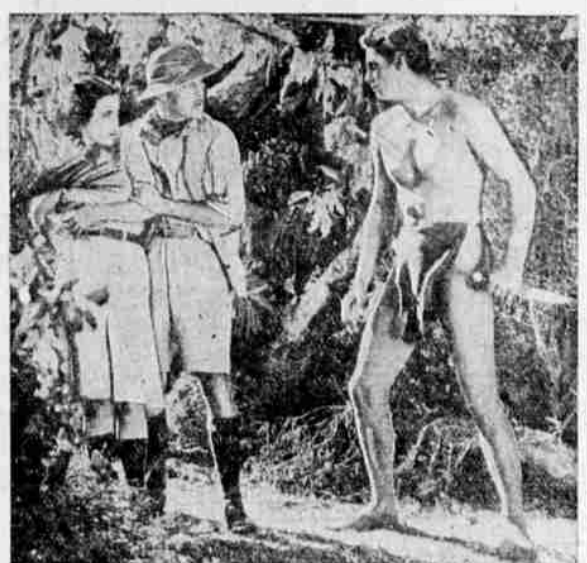
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Noted Swimmer, Craterian Hit

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CHAMBER PLANS MALE CHORUS TO LIVEN MEETINGS

Plans for the formation of a male chorus of forty members, as a means of reviving interest in music in Medford, and to provide music for many civic events in this city were announced Saturday by W. S. Bolger, president of the local Chamber of Commerce. The new organization will be patterned after the Eugene Gleemen, a musical group which has been functioning successfully for the past eight years, and it is believed that the plan will meet with immediate response on the part of the community at large.

James Stevens, one of Medford's outstanding singers and musicians, will direct the new organization, whose initial meeting will be held at the Chamber of Commerce building a 7:30 p. m., Thursday, when all men interested in becoming members of the chorus are requested to be present. According to present plans, membership will be limited to forty, and it is expected that there will be little difficulty in securing a full quota at once.

The local Chamber of Commerce will assist in the organization of the new group, which will thereafter elect its own officers and directors.

Membership in the new organization will be determined by a test for each applicant, and after the allotment of the club is filled, a waiting list will be formed for prospective members.

It is particularly appropriate that the proposed Medford chorus be inaugurated during the coming week, which is National Music Week, and a large number of prospective members will undoubtedly be present at the Chamber of Commerce next Thursday evening for the organization meeting.
