PASADENA, Calif., May 2.—"Faithful unto death" is the epitaph for "Kop"—(Roma A. Koppes) who last Saturday night finally yielded to the call he had refused to heed for so many years. A man of less courage, of downright grit, of less determination to fight the good fight regardless of the odds, would have given up the struggle years ago. But there was no such word as quit in Kop's vocabulary. Physical blow after physical blow he suffered, but the harder he was knocked down the stronger he came back, and we know without being told, that up to the very last his thoughts, next to his family, were for his newspaper.

SUCH loyalty is rare these days, though we believe it is more common in the newspaper business than any other. Kop was a born newspaper man, and before his health started to fail, enjoyed a most successful career as political reporter on one of the leading dailies in Cleveland, Ohio. He numbered among his personal friends, former President Harding, and Myron Herrick, former Governor of Ohio and U. S. Ambassador to France.

ONLY a few weeks before his death Kop wrote one of his whimsical amusing sketches, full of local color and genuine "character," that it brought a deserved bouquet from Ye Editor. Combined with his humor so individual in character, Kop had the keenest sense of political values, an unerring instinct as to how the wind of popular feeling was blowing, and for over a decade his services in this direction, were invaluable, to the editorial department of the paper.

That, probably, was not necessary. Capone, having lost his fight for liberty, his "mob" like other mobs, forgetful, and not grateful, will find another leader in the modern industry of bootlegging.

Capone feels that he is the victim of that which the gangster hates above all things, "the double-cross." He understood that he was to make conviction easy, the government would get part of his earnings on which he had paid no income tax, and he was to be sent to jail only for two years, then resume business and quickly make up his loss.

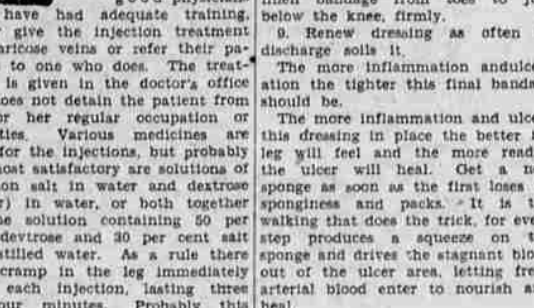

RUBBER SPONGE TREATMENT OF VARICOSE ULCER.

Probably the best treatment for chronic ulcer on the leg from varicose veins is the obliteration of the varicose vein which supplies the ulcerated area. The presence of varicose ulcer or eczema is not a complication which contraindicates the injection treatment for varicose veins. No saturday's all good physicians



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS. How the Nose Gently. Is it advisable to blow the nose by holding first one nostril closed with the finger, then the other? S. H. J.

Some victims of chronic varicose ulcer cannot or will not submit to obliteration of the veins. A valuable treatment in such cases is the rubber sponge treatment. This is briefly as follows:

1. Cleanse the ulcer and the skin around it with benzine. 2. Paint the ulcer with a 10 per cent solution of silver nitrate. 3. Apply to ulcer some simple boracic acid ointment.
