### Poppies Going To France For Soldier Graves

A large shipment of poppies, made by disabled American World war veterans, is now on its way to France to be placed on the graves of the American war dead on Memorial day. The flowers have been sent to the American Legion post in Paris, which will supervise their placing.

Paul Claudel, French ambassador to the United States, received the flowers officially in the name of the French republic at recent ceremonies in Washington, D. C. The presentation was made by Mrs. Frederick C. Williams of Tuckahoe, N. T., national president of the auxiliary, acting for the disabled veterans of America.

The poppies are the same as those being made by disabled veterans in the government hospital at Portland, Ore., which the women of Medford American Legion auxiliary will sell May 20-21, to be worn in honor of the war dead. Each disabled man making poppies was asked to contribute one flower as his individual token of remembrance for his comrades lying in overseas graves.

### COURT PONDERING JUVENILES' FATE

William Benford and Frederick White, both 17, alleged members of the "boy burglar gang" operating in this city the past month, were given a hearing this morning before Juvenile Court Judge C. B. Lamkin. They were ordered remanded to the county jail until a decision was reached in their cases. The pair are claimed to have operated with Glen Hanscom and Clifford Clark, both 19, who appeared before Circuit Judge Norton Tuesday. Their cases were taken under advisement for 30 days.

Friends this morning interceded for the youths. They were described as "good boys."

Evan Crow, a youth often in the juvenile court and paroled, was scheduled for appearance in circuit court today for alleged theft.

County authorities are now taking the position that youthful offenders should be dealt with more harshly, as paroles granted over a two-year period have failed to yield expected reformations.

Benford and White, with Hanscom and Clark, were charged with burglary.

### MATTHEWS HOME FROM 10 MONTHS' STAY IN PRISON

Raleigh Matthews, widely known resident of the Eagle Point district, sentenced to serve two years in state prison upon conviction of liquor violations in connection with the raiding of a still on Rees creek in 1930, which ended with the tragic death of Everett Dahack, a kinsman, was paroled from the penitentiary April 1. Matthews returned to this valley and is now engaged in farming on his place in the Eagle Point district.

Matthews served ten months of a two-year sentence. His first application for parole was disapproved by the parole board following protests submitted by local authorities and citizens. No protests were filed on the second appeal. Matthews has

been more or less in the courts of Jackson county for several years. During his incarceration in the "big house," he was a model prisoner and enjoyed special privileges, being engaged largely in outdoor farm work. Evidence at the trial of Matthews showed that he was among those present when the raiders swooped down on the Rees creek still and his attempted flight, resulted in the firing of the shot that ended in the death of Dahack.

It is understood that Frank Bennett, serving three years from this county upon conviction for a statutory offense involving a 15-year old girl, will make application at the May meeting of the state parole board.

### FRESH SNOW FALLS IN HIGHER REGIONS

New snow has fallen in the higher levels. Three inches of fresh snow was reported today in the Fish Lake area, and 10 inches in the Dead In-

dian district. The fall at Crater lake was light, and it is expected the highway will be in excellent condition for week-end travel. All the irrigation reservoirs of the valley are filling gradually. A predicted spell of seasonable warm weather will melt the snow fast. There is a heavy run-off of water now underway in the streams of this section.
