

BOSTON BRAVES FACE TRIAL BY WESTERN FOES

League Leaders Will Play All Four Western Teams On Invasion—Phils Flattened in Farewell Game

By GAYLE TALBOT, (Associated Press Sports Writer) Having won their spurs in the east, Bill McKechnie's Boston Braves invaded the western strongholds of the National League today for a whirlwind two week's campaign that will prove pretty definitely whether they can "take it."

In that time the current leaders will meet all four western members, including their closest rivals, the Chicago Cubs, and the champion St. Louis Cardinals. If the Braves hold their own somebody will have to take them very seriously.

Flattened Phillies. In their parting shot at sectional neighbors yesterday, the Braves flattened the Phillies, 3 to 0. Huck Betts, the veteran "rookie," turned in his third consecutive victory, as he held the slugging Phils to four hits.

The Cardinals showed up into the first division with their second straight shut-out over Cincinnati, 7 to 0. Flint Rhem became the fourth Card hurler to pitch brilliant ball in as many days when he limited the Reds to six hits, three of them by George Grantham.

Wrecked Wins for Cubs. The youngster, Lonnie Warneke, recorded his fourth victory as the Chicago Cubs defeated Pittsburgh, 4 to 1. He scattered six hits and received noble support, while the Pirate defense crumbled at crucial moments behind Larry French.

Brooklyn and New York spent the day traveling west. The Cleveland Indians, sharing second place and the leadership of the American league's western division with the Detroit Tigers, defeated the Browns, 8 to 3, on the eve of their first visit to the seaboard. It was their tenth victory in their last eleven starts. They make their first stand against the Athletics today.

Tigers Take Final. John Stone's home run in the seventh inning with two aboard enabled the Detroit Tigers to come from behind and take their final from the White Sox, 8 to 7. Stanley Harris' troupe opens against the Yankees tomorrow.

The four eastern clubs were unscheduled, but the Yanks sharpened up their batting eyes in a 5 to 3 exhibition victory over Bridgeport of the Eastern League.

FARM AID PLAN PLEASERS KANSAN

WASHINGTON, May 5.—(AP)—The domestic allotment farm relief plan, as presented in Washington by M. L. Wilson of the Montana State Agricultural college, has, in the opinion of Representative Hope of Kansas, some "great possibilities."

Hope, from the largest wheat state in the country, said today that an educational program to get the farmers and organized agriculture back on the plan was necessary to interest congress.

The domestic allotment plan—differing from that sponsored by the farmers' union—seeks to give the tariff benefits back to the farmers. The farm board would direct its operation, but the administration would be local with farmers agreeing to cut their acreage when necessary.

SARPOLIS PINIONS TED THYE BY MIX OUTSIDE OF ROPES

PORTLAND, Ore., May 5.—(AP)—Dr. Karl Sarpolis, 205 pounds, Cleveland, defeated Ted Thye, 199, Portland, two out of three falls here last night.

Sarpolis took the first fall in 18 minutes, 9 seconds, with a flying body scissor. Thye came back to take the second in 11 minutes, 51 seconds, with a wristlock and head scissors after patting the way with shoulder butts.

A mixup outside the ring was responsible for Thye dropping the final fall. After teasing Sarpolis outside the ring with a wristlock, Thye jumped out after him, but Sarpolis beat him to it with a flying body scissor. Thye was stunned when he hit the bare boards, but managed to crawl back into the ring before being counted out. Sarpolis ended it with rabbit punches and head scissors. Time for third fall was 4 minutes, 30 seconds.

SAVAGE RAPIDS DAM ASCENSION EASY FOR FISH

Difficulties encountered by fish in making the ladder at Savage Rapids dam were greatly exaggerated in recent reports here, according to Ed Walker of the game division of the state police. There is no chicken wire interfering with the progress of the fish, he stated today, the trouble is purely one of too much water, the ladder having been constructed to operate more successfully during low water.

Officials are on duty at the dam and 18 arrests have been made, the cases including gaffing of fish, fishing without license and fishing with two poles. The most recent violators of the game law arrested were two Grants Pass men, found with two gunny sacks of salmon taken from the dam. Their trials have been set for Saturday.

Fish, when migrating, travel in bands, it was pointed out today regarding the ladder problem, and unless the leader finds the way over the ladder none of his company will make the trip. Experiments are being made at the dam to aid the migration and it is hoped that the wrangling regarding the situation will cease before a movement is started to close the Rogue to fishing for a distance of one mile and a half below the dam.

A few fish are now being caught at Savage Rapids and the lowering of the water line is expected to bring fine fishing for the week-end. A large run of salmon is reported in the lower Rogue. Seventeen were landed from one pier below the mouth of the Applegate Sunday.
