YOUNG HIJACKER TO BOYS SCHOOL UNTIL MAJORITY

Woodrow Wilson Shaw, 17, who confessed to the authorities that with Evan Crow, 21, and James Nelson, 23, he engaged in hi-jacking operations, involving robbery of homes in this city, was Saturday morning sentenced to the state industrial school at Salem, "there to remain until 21 years of age." The records show that Shaw was sentenced to the reform school in 1930, and paroled to an uncle living in Klamath county. He violated this parole. Crow and Nelson face two year prison terms imposed Friday in circuit court. Shaw appeared in juvenile court.

Willard Benford, 17, and Frederick White, 17, admitted members of a boy burglar gang, were each sentenced to the reform school and sentence suspended for 30 days. In the meantime they must spend ten days in the county jail and be kept at hard labor around the courthouse. Glen Hanson and Clifford Clarke, pals of the younger boys, are under observation of the circuit court for 30 days before final disposition of their cases.

Glen Maharry, 17, and George Winkelman, 15, both of Talent, charged with theft of gasoline from farm machinery, were each sentenced to the reform school and paroled to their fathers. Maharry is prohibited from driving an auto for sixty days. Any violation of the parole will result in immediate revoking of the reform school sentence.

Confronted with a rising tide of contempt among young boys for the court and parole, county authorities have announced that in the future firmer measures will be taken with juvenile offenders, particularly those who have been in trouble before.

Crow and Nelson will be taken to the penitentiary Monday and Shaw to the reform school on the same day.
