

### GRIMES' RETURN BOLSTERS CUBS' PITCHING STAFF

#### Veteran Back in Game After Influenza Attack, Turns in 12 to 5 Victory Over Carey's Brooklyn Dodgers

By HERBERT W. BARKER (Associated Press Sports Writer). Burleigh Grimes, whose name is synonymous with baseball courage, is back in harness again and the Chicago Cubs, tough enough without him, are just that much more formidable.

An attack of influenza laid low the veteran right hander just as the 1932 campaign opened, but he came back yesterday to survive a three-run attack by the Brooklyn Dodgers in the first inning and finally beat them, 12-5.

Dazzler Blows Up. Dazzy Vance, usually extremely effective against the Cubs, had one man out in the third inning when he lost control, walked three men in a row, and was unceremoniously yanked. Before the inning was over the Cubs had scored five times, and taken a 7-4 lead.

This victory stretched Chicago's advantage in the National league to three full games as the Boston Braves lost their fourth straight to the Cincinnati Reds, 6-5.

Giants, Cards Split. The New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals split a double bill. The Giants won the opener, 4-1, as Carl Hubbell allowed only six hits, the Cardinals the nightcap, 6-5, as the eccentric Dizzy Dean went the route for the champions.

The Washington Senators maintained their lead in the American league by nosing out the Chicago White Sox, 6-5, in 14 innings. Cleveland walloped the Philadelphia Athletics again, 8-5, and the Boston Red Sox broke an eight-game losing streak at the St. Louis Browns' expense, 7-5.

### MEIER ADVOCATES CHANGES TO LIFT TAXPAYERS' LOAD

(Continued from Page One) give thoughtful consideration to the provisions of our present income tax statutes and suggest amendments thereof that may appear desirable," the governor stated in his recommendations. He had previously recommended a general committee to work out the combined tax control plan.

"I earnestly recommend that this body, through the studies of an appropriate committee, give serious consideration to the subject of advisable consolidations of local units of government, to the end that taxing and borrowing powers may be centralized and co-ordinated and that responsibility for expenditure of public funds may be more definitely allocated," the governor continued.

Would Merge Schools. "As an important function of such a committee, I suggest that a careful study be made of the county unit system for the reorganization of school districts. Our present county unit plan, in optional effect since 1921, has thus far been adopted in only three counties. The law apparently requires improvements to make it more acceptable to other counties of the state.

"I also suggest that this committee make a study of the county unit system in effect in the state of Utah where, as I am informed, there are only 40 school districts in the entire state, as compared with some thirty-one hundred in Oregon. I am also advised that, under the county unit system, general efficiency in elementary education has been materially advanced in Utah

and, at the same time, that current per capita educational expenditures are far below those of any other western state, the comparison given being \$100.08 in the former and \$76.92 in the latter. Salaries Inequal. "The need for some fair and reasonable plan in the fixing of salaries of public officers and employees is apparent. This matter has so long been handled without consistent process, in utter disregard of rhyme or reason, that wide differences and inequalities have resulted in rates of compensation for similar services. While this is a difficult problem it is not impossible of solution, and I suggest that the subject be assigned to a committee of this legislature for study and recommendation."

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
