The study portrays the wealth and importance of the entire section as a market for a wide range of the manufactured goods and other products of all sections of the country. The people of the Pacific Northwest, the government report points out, buy and sell in every market of the United States. Their relations in export and import trade extend to practically every country in the world. Agriculture, lumbering and manufacturing alone, according to the survey, are found to add more than \$1,000,000,000 potential buying power to the pockets of Pacific Northwest residents annually. With 25 per cent of the total population of the country, it is shown, the Pacific Northwest cuts over 35 per cent of all the timber, mines 15 per cent of the copper, produces nearly 25 per cent of the lead and about 15 per cent of the zinc. Its wheat farms grow one-eighth of the country's entire crop, and its orchards more than 35 per cent of the commercial apple crop and 28 per cent of the pears. On the Northwest ranges 15 per cent of all the wool is produced, while the coast fishing industry accounts for about 5 per cent.

EXPECT DIVERSION OF HIGHWAY FUND

The state highway commission at its next meeting is expected to grant the request of the county court that \$20,000 of the \$30,000 of state funds allotted for the Sams Valley secondary road construction be diverted to the Little Butte market road. This would leave \$10,000 for the Sams Valley road and spread the money over a wider area and furnish work for more county residents. L. M. Sweet of Sams Valley has appeared before the county court and protested any diversion of the fund. Josephine county road enthusiasts are also strong for expending the full amount on the Sams Valley route. It would be a connecting link between the Pacific highway and the Crater Lake highway. The county court holds that it has a right to say where the road funds shall be expended within its own border.
