

### MRS. OSBORNE OF THIS CITY FETED AT NURSES' MEET

Mrs. O. E. Osborne of 812 South Oakdale, a resident of Medford for the past 28 years, was one of the most feted graduate nurses at the institute in Portland last week, honoring the 35th anniversary of the State Nurses association, according to reports from the Rose city.

Introduced as the first member of the examining board in the state of Oregon, and former president for a period of 12 years, as well as the pioneer nurse of southern Oregon, Mrs. Osborne's participation in the program of the northern city brought much attention to Medford.

At the banquet at the Heathman hotel Thursday night, Mrs. Osborne, with Miss Mae Kennedy of the Dunning institute of Chicago, was initiated into the Mystic Order of the Rose. Each was presented a beautiful bouquet of crimson roses in appreciation of their participation in health work.

Medford invitation to the association to meet here for the 1933 convention was presented at the same banquet, by Mayor E. M. Wilson. The invitation was first introduced by a stunt prepared in the lobby of the hotel, where an Austin car was placed. The car carried a banner inviting the association to the "biggest little city in the west," and a review of Medford's attractions was listed, with special attention given to Crater lake and the pear industry.

No choice of meeting place for the 1933 convention was made, but will be announced later.

Other nurses attending the institute with Mrs. Osborne, registrar for the local district, were: Misses Thelma Kent, Blanche Runnels, Phyllis Sweasinger, Mabel Coffey, Martha Hanley and Sister Theresa Agnes.
