

CALIFORNIA SPEED DEMON RETURNING FOR BOAT RACES

Word was received today from Everett Wilbur of Sacramento by members of the Medford "Navy" that he would attend the speed boat races which will be held at Emigrant dam, May 22, to defend his laurels won at the first meet held here a few weeks ago.

Everett Wilbur will be remembered as the lad who drove Miss Sacramento to two firsts in the meet held here at Emigrant last month and captured in the marathon while battling for first place with Heine Fluhrer, local driver. Wilbur was in second place in the first lap of the marathon with Fluhrer in the lead. On the south corner he made a desperate effort to take the corner on the inside and gain the lead but took it a bit too fast and was thrown out of the boat which landed right side up.

He swam back to his boat but he could not get his motor started again as the spray had fouled it up. Fluhrer held the lead for 16 laps with a good margin to spare when he spilled on the opposite corner. Meyers who was following him in second place also spilled in the same spot. Both drivers are still wondering what happened.

Wilbur will also bring along his brother who took third in the run-around race. They also white that they have three or four outfits from the Sacramento valley who will come with them and endeavor to take the winnings back to California.

Joe Meyers, local driver, purchased the boat, Miss Sacramento, which Wilbur drove to victory. Wilbur, whose father and brother are boat builders in Sacramento, will bring another hull of the same type. This will furnish two evenly matched hulls with the same size and type motor. It will mean a question of out and out driving when these two speed artists tangle.

None Has Margin Taking into account the normal expectancy of both sides, the Democratic no-man's-land of disputed delegate strength is growing very narrow. Neither the Roosevelt camp nor the opposition, when they get right down to counting noses, claims any great margin of safety. It comes down to a comparatively few delegates, most of them temporarily pledged to favorite sons.

Roosevelt not only added three states to his column this week, but he did it impressively, with an unquestioned display of driving power. Arizona and Wyoming instructed for him, despite previous signs of hesitancy. In the West Virginia primary he overwhelmed "Alfalfa Bill" Murray ten to one.

Dark Horses Paraded At the same time, two favorite sons were receiving the formal pledges of their home states, and the whole paddock of dark horses was paraded again before the eyes of the voters.

In gathering in Ohio, Governor White has a delegation whose ultimate destination no one knows. Maryland's instructions for Governor Albert C. Ritchie were coincident with revived activity for him as a second choice in many states. There was a great stir meantime among the friends of Owen D. Young, Newton D. Baker, Harry F. Byrd and Melvin A. Traylor, and a split developed in Illinois, forecasting a division of votes between Roosevelt and Traylor on the break-up.

Roosevelt Far Ahead In actual figures Roosevelt remains so far ahead that no one else is in the same class. Of instructed, pledged and claimed delegates chosen to date, he has 360; James Hamilton Lewis, 58; White, 52; Alfred E. Smith, 46; John H. Garner, 44; James R. Reed, 36; Murray, 23; Ritchie, 16.

On the Republican side, President Hoover continues to pile up delegate strength long after he has passed the number needed to nominate, but life as a candidate is not all roses for him, at that. The pressure on him to approve this or that prohibition plank grows more and more insistent as the convention date approaches.

Ohio Turns Moir Within the week Republican modifications have swept Ohio's primary for senator and governor; the American minister to Sweden, John Morehead, has appeared with state department approval before a committee of congress to advocate the Swedish system of liquor control, and a somewhat similar scheme has been given public approval by Senator David Reed of Pennsylvania, a stalwart of the stalwarts.
