Southern Oregon's First Fair Was Held in 1897

(Ed. Note: Medford history compiled by members of Crater Lake chapter, D. A. R., continued from last Sunday.) Chapter 10 Medford had for a number of years joined with Central Point in both fairs and horse racing, but in 1897 the Southern Oregon Fair association was incorporated. A. S. Bliton, J. A. Whitman, I. L. Hamilton and J. W. Lawton being named as members of the corporation. Land was purchased in the north part of town, buildings erected and a race track built and that fall a fair was held in Medford for the first time. Racing was a favorite sport in those days and there were many thoroughbred horses owned in the valley. D. T. and W. E. Lawton have always remained true admirers of thoroughbred horses. But gone are the hitching posts which were once so conspicuous and necessary along our business streets and now the council turns to parking ordinances, and we have the county fair grounds south of the city while the fair grounds in the north end are but a memory. March 14, 1898, the leading business men of the town met and organized a board of trade. Captain W. S. Crowell was elected president, H. Klippel vice president, J. A. Whitman secretary and J. E. Enyard, treasurer. This was the forerunner of the Medford Commercial club which was organized in the summer of 1902 with C. I. Hutchinson as first president. The rooms were over Hutchinson and Lumsden's store where H. Worthington presided as secretary. The present exhibit building by the railroad was built in 1909 and formally opened May 15, 1909, the Commercial club moving there soon afterwards. In 1918 the name was changed to "The Medford Chamber of Commerce." It was in July, 1908 that Medford first began receiving daily weather reports. The first rural mail delivery to be made from this office started July 17, 1908. The post office has been moved from Front street to Main, then to South Central, afterwards to North Central and finally to the Federal building on Sixth street between Holly and Ivy streets. M. Purdin was postmaster following J. S. Howard and was the one who moved the office to South Central. The Medford Mail Tribune is Medford's oldest newspaper, having been started February 20, 1895, when Mc-Ginnis started the "Medford Monitor." The next year Ira A. Phelps bought the paper changing its name to "The Medford Advertiser." He sold it to W. H. Hagan who changed the name to "The Southern Oregonian" (Continued next Sunday)

MEDFORD REALTY BOARD ORGANIZES OWNER DIVISION

Medford Realty board held an interesting session Friday when a new group was formed, known as the Property Owner Division of the Medford Realty board. All owners of real estate interested in the welfare of real property and in matters affecting its stability, but who are not licensed brokers, can become members of this group, associated with the realty board and eligible to attend meetings and participate in all matters, excepting such as are reserved to the active members, who are regularly licensed and bonded brokers under the state law. The board extends a cordial invitation to all such owners to meet with them at their next regular luncheon at the Holland Hotel, May 20 at 12 o'clock. Brokers reported a number of new real estate loans being made by local people recently, and a seeming tendency on the part of some citizens to look again to good first mortgage real estate loans for investment, instead of investments that have in the past become too intangible to be satisfactory, as one lady stated she "can at least walk past a piece of real estate that she has a loan on and take a good look at it, and it seems much more substantial than some other securities which have shrunk to such an extent that they are hardly visible." The realty board is keeping up efforts to relieve the home owner with their shelter tax exemption movement and is gaining friends for the cause among many influential people throughout the state. J.
