

J'VILLE BASEBALL WAR LOOMS OVER BENCHED PITCHER

Rumblings of war in Jacksonville's baseball sector may come to a head today when the "Pirates," sponsored and equipped by the Jacksonville chamber of commerce, cross bats with the Medford Eagles. Ben Coffman, hurler, who, fans from the former county seat say, has been kept warming the bench while non-resident pitchers have been used and the team has consistently lost, will be on the mound for the Eagles, and should he defeat his erstwhile teammates, the fat will be in the fire.

According to Jacksonville fans there has been much dissatisfaction among townsmen as intention of the chamber of commerce was to support a team composed of local players. The real team of local players, it is contended, is the Jacksonville Gold Diggers, who lack equipment but put a 100 per cent native-son lineup in the field when they play.

While the "Pirates" management claims there are not sufficient home-grown players to fill the berths on the team, the Gold Diggers say they have no difficulty in finding plenty of good baseball talent right at home.

Should Coffman, Jacksonville hurler who tried of warming the bench for his home town, toe the slab for the Medford Eagles today and turn in a win, there will be "something doing in the old town," say partisan fans.

While the Eagles-Pirates clash is being carried on, the Grants, Pass and Talent teams will play at Talent. Neither the Eagles or Grants Pass has suffered defeat this season and the day's tilt carry big possibilities in the title race.

BURGOO KING IN SECOND VICTORY WINS PREAKNESS

BALTIMORE, Md., May 14.—(AP)—Burgoo King, a royally bred son of the bluegrass, moved into the select circle of great thoroughbreds as he capped his Kentucky victory with a driving triumph in the forty-second running of the Preakness at Pimlico today.

Coming from behind to nab the decision in the closing strides, the E. R. Bradley colt equalled the performance of the mighty Sir Barton and the great Gallant Fox, heretofore the only two horses that ever won both the derby and the preakness.

The king, meeting eight crack colts three year olds, was a great hero in his victory. Running over a track at least a second slow, he came within one and four fifths seconds of equalling the track record as he reeled off the one and three sixteenths miles in 1:59 4-5.

A crowd of 40,000 said to be the largest in the history of the classic, saw the chestnut son of Bubbling Over nab Mrs. Louis G. Kaufman's Tick On, the favorite and Walter M. Jefford's Bostwain, an outsider in the final strides.

NEW GOLF LINKS OPEN FOR PLAY

Medford's new public golf links opened for play this morning and many local and out-of-town golfers were expected to try out the sporty nine-hole course during the day. The course, which is reached by turning to the right on Highland avenue from East Main and thence onto Keenway drive, has a beautiful setting on gently sloping terrain with a magnificent view of the valley.

Par for the nine holes has been set by F. W. Chausse, proprietor, at 34 and entails a trek of 2773 yards. Women's par is 40.

There are two dog-leg holes, numbers six and nine, and two extremely sporty holes, numbers three and eight. The balance of the layout offers no great difficulty for the average or better golfer.

The fairways have been made as nearly ball-proof as possible and Mr. Chausse has taken pains to see that players find all the conveniences of the best and most modern courses.

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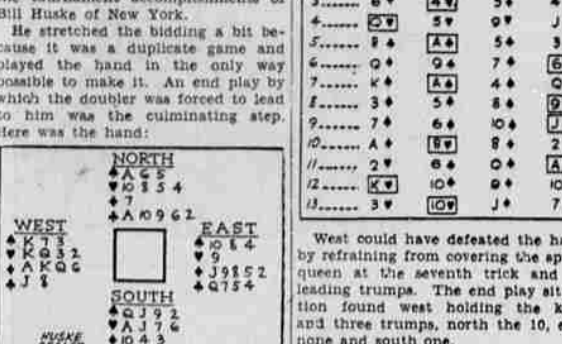
Tips on CONTRACT

THE ONLY WAY TO WIN

It would seem almost impossible to fill a contract at four hearts doubled when one opponent held four trumps to the king-queen and a total of more than three honor tricks.

Yet success at such a task is among the tournament accomplishments of Bill Huske of New York.

West could have defeated the hand by refraining from covering the spade queen at the seventh trick and by leading trumps. The end play situation found west holding the king and three trumps, north the 10, east none and south one.

The lead of the 10 of diamonds by south on trick 12 forced west to trump with the king of hearts and he had nothing left but the three of hearts to lead.
