Stars Reach Peak.

# SWETONIC PROVES MAJOR SENSATION IN SUPER-HURLING

Steve Swetonic, a home-town boy who made good, is becoming the pitching sensation of the National league.

The crack right hander of the Pittsburgh Pirates pitched his third shutout of the season yesterday, halting the Brooklyn Dodgers with two hits for a 2-0 victory.

Previously he had blanked the Cardinals and the Cubs with three hits apiece. All told this season he has permitted only 14 hits in 26 innings and won three games and lost one.

The Boston Braves moved up to within one game of first place by walloping the St. Louis Cardinals 8-3 while the league leading Chicago Cubs were bowing to the Phillies, 8-6.

The Phillies gave Lon Warneke his first defeat, pounding him for 12 hits including home runs by Klein, Hurst and Virgil Davis, a triple by Hurst, and doubles by Hurst, Mallon and Virgil Davis.

The Giants beat the Cincinnati Reds, 9-1.

In the American league, Charley Ruffing held the Cleveland Indians to four hits and struck out 12 men in a 5-0 victory that put the Yankees within a game and a half of the league leading Washington Senators.

The Senators were beaten by the St. Louis Browns as Walter Stewart allowed only four hits. Charley Gehring's seventh home run marked a five-run fifth inning rally that gave the Detroit Tigers a 7-2 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics.

The Chicago White Sox pounded Wiley Moore for nine hits and eight runs in the first two innings to beat the Boston Red Sox easily, 9-2.

# BUDWEISER HOPS 13 FEET TO SHAME OTHER FROGS

ANGELS CAMP, Cal., May 15.—(AP) With a single record-smashing spring, Budweiser, pride of Stockton, Cal., today had leaped into unquestioned leadership of the world's jumping frogs.

In a cool but astounding performance at the Calaveras county frog jumping jubilee yesterday, he smashed his own record set last year by two feet, with a hop of 13 feet five inches.

Budweiser's defense of his championship left other stalwarts, including five much-touted entries from the Washington, D. C. fire department, virtually standing at the post. Louis Fischer, owner and trainer of the two-time champion, was visible in the glare of the achievement, but Budweiser modestly declined to comment.

The performance, witnessed by a crowd of promoters estimated at 20,000, was amid a colorful scene in the little hill mining camp, site of Mark Twain's classic jumping frog tale. Indiana, oak teams, mule jerk-line teams, and other sights reminiscent of the '90s were on hand.

This setting and the honors heaped upon him when he was welcomed by Mayor A. D. Mentz at the outskirts of the town and escorted to the scene of his triumph by an honor guard and a brass band, failed to disturb the coolness of Budweiser. Calmly flexing his powerful muscles, he set himself for the task and then jumped such a jump as this frog-jumping town had never before witnessed.

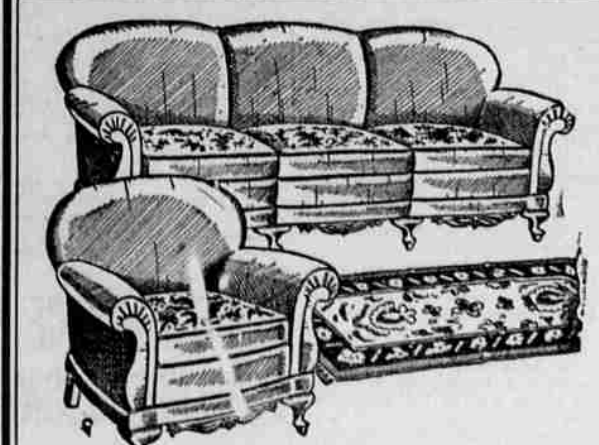
