MOTT STRIKES AT 'RACKET' EDITORS IN PROBE DEMAND

this state, and in violation of the specific statutes denouncing slander or libel of a public official with intent to influence his official course of conduct. "Charlesworth recently published in the 'Saturday Night' a statement signed by M. O. Mathews of Salem, insinuating that I defrauded him in a real estate transaction. The Mathews statement is identical with one which J. S. Moltsner, formerly managing director of the Guardian Building & Loan association, attempted to have introduced in the Guardian hearing before Judge Lusk a year ago, and which was thrown out by the jurist.

Statements Held False "Both statements are, of course, deliberately and utterly false and libelous.

"A copy of this statement was published in the Canby Herald and Woodburn Independent. You are directed to issue grand jury subpoenas to the editors of these two publications for the purpose of ascertaining their motives and purposes in publishing this statement. If the evidence shows that the Mathews statement was published in 'Saturday Night' by Mathews' consent or authority, I direct that you secure indictment against him."

Mott further charged that he had received authoritative information that unless he returned the Prudential group of savings and loan associations into control of Johnson and Degraze the "New Examiner" would launch a personal attack against him.

Not to Return Prudential "I have advised Johnson and Degraze that the Prudential group will not be returned to its former owners," Mott declared. Goldstein was directed by Mott to present to the Multnomah county grand jury all evidence gathered in the alleged conspiracy, immediately following the close of the trial of O. P. Coshov, which is now in progress at Dallas.

Mott set out in his letter that both Johnson and Degraze are now under charges of embezzlement in Multnomah county.
