and I challenge and re-challenge him to cite one instance. Can there be any broader challenge to any man who even counts himself as law-abiding? Can there be greater indignation against a man seeking public office if he fails to produce one article from his newspaper wherein he has upheld the officers of law as against the slimy underworld?

Call to mind, if you will, Mr. Voter, what he said about August D. Singler, who as sheriff of Jackson county was brutally murdered in the discharge of duty by a thug. Recall, if you will, his article on the Bowles-Loucks murder trial in Portland one year ago, where the wife of Bowles was killed in the apartment of Miss Loucks, where she had apparently gone to talk to Miss Loucks about the love affair she (Miss Loucks) was having with her (Mrs. Bowles) husband, and Mr. Fehel condemns the law enforcement bodies for bringing Miss Loucks and Mr. Bowles to trial, and where in the same article he says there was nothing wrong about Mr. Bowles seeking Miss Loucks' company, notwithstanding the fact that Mr. Bowles had spent night after night in the apartment of Miss Loucks, deserting his own home and fireplace. These instances and these articles are pointed out to show the character and the trend of mind of the man who wrote them, Mr. Fehel.

Call to mind, if you will, what he said about the judges of election, when he demanded a recount of the votes in the last city election. Such women as Mrs. Applegate, Mrs. Roy Lewis and Mrs. Arnsperger.

No, it is not surprising that Mr. Fehel has failed to even attempt to answer my former challenge. Any man who stands upon a false premise, whose life consists of noise, bluff and hokey, is always cowardly, and never meets any issue in a straightforward way. In my former articles I asked him to explain his utterances to the public—not to me. His cowardly bluff in which he advertised in the newspaper, stating "If Pipes is present at the Armory I will answer him," is typical of his ignorance and bluff.

It was not necessary for Pipes to be present for him to explain his utterances of support for one of our lowest criminals. Nor was it necessary for Pipes to be present for him to explain his friendship for the taxpayers in his sale of the Washington school site to the school board for \$5250, which was purchased by the Fehel on tax title for \$2675. Perhaps this exhibition of friendship for the taxpayers was the inspiration that coined his phrase "The gravy train."

CANDIDATES BUSY IN ELEVENTH HOUR CHASE OF VOTERS

will not be inclined to heed appeals to prejudices or sympathy.

The inevitable final hour canards are scheduled to make appearance late today. In the past they have been circulated through the medium of handbills, thrown into autos, or slipped under doorways at night. Candidates and their workers alike have warned voters to disregard all such.

The voting place for the Newtown precinct is the First Methodist church, not the South Methodist church, across the street. The West Medford voting precinct is at the Summit Grocery, located at Summit avenue and Second street.

The Mail Tribune will announce election returns as fast as they are available on the returns from the state and county. Figures from the precincts with double counting boards will be released as soon as the polls close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening, and by 9:00 o'clock from many of the smaller precincts of the county. A slow count is anticipated, as there are three separate ballots to count—Republican, Democrat and non-partisan judiciary.

Little interest has been manifested locally in the state and congressional races. Senator Steiwer and Congressman Hawley were regarded as winners. There has been some Clark and Stanfield sentiment for senator, but it is not large.

Wagering on the election—an old American custom—was the lightest in years. The most popular bet was that Fehel would not win the Republican nomination for county judge and that Jennings would win the Democratic nomination for sheriff. Distribution of the ballot boxes to the various precincts was completed late today. Election officials will open the polls at 8:00 o'clock sharp.
