the money through a cemetery hedge in a suitcase.

John Hughes Curtis, confessed Norfolk boxer, remained in jail at Flemington, N. J., as relatives in Virginia prepared to obtain his release by raising the \$10,000 bail in which he is held for grand jury action.

Police let it be known that they were still very anxious to confront Curtis with Dean Dobson-Peacock, who was associated with him in negotiations for return of the baby which Curtis admits were all faked.

In his morning bulletin Colonel H. Norman Schwarzkopf, superintendent of New Jersey state police, said he would gladly pay the minister's traveling expenses but the dean replied at Norfolk he had been advised by counsel not to come here.
Dr. Condon spent two hours and a quarter with the Bronx grand jury, telling of his ransom payment. He signed a waiver of immunity.
New Jersey detectives assigned to stay with him had expected to visit more rogue's galleries in New Jersey this afternoon but when he came out of the grand jury room the aged educator told them he had to go to New Rochelle, N. Y., to conduct an examination of teachers.
