

HEAVY BALLOTING MARKS ELECTION IN NEARBY TOWNS

were unable to find the official ballots and called County Clerk DeLitta S. Meyer. In the midst of the excitement the judge found the ballots, sealed in an envelope in the ballot box.

Voters who changed their political faiths sought this morning in vain to switch back to their original party. These requests were not granted as there can be no change of registration after the registration books close a month before election. The registration books for the November election will open Monday and be kept open until 30 days before the general election. Several voters were much disgusted when they discovered they had not registered at all.

22 Double Boards

Twenty-two of the 58 precincts have double boards. The second board will start counting at one o'clock this afternoon, and some at ten o'clock in the morning. These double boards are stationed in the largest precincts of the county, and the count as far as it has progressed will be available when the polls close at eight o'clock tonight. Three double boards are installed in the Ashland Boulevard, Southeast, and Northeast precincts, in all but North Central and East precincts of this city, and in Jacksonville, Central Point, Eagle Point, Ferrisville, West Phoenix and Rony Ann. The count there ought to show the trend of the vote for the county offices, except where it is exceptionally close.

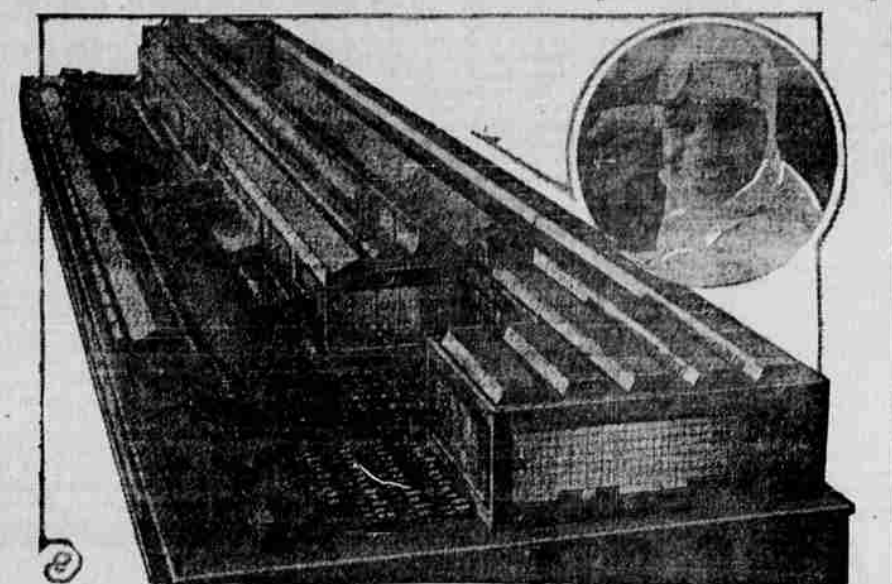
