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NEW FAST PLANES ON MEDFORD RUN TO SPEED SERVICE

Construction has commenced at the Boeing Airplane company of Seattle on a large fleet of new twin-engined monoplane transports which will be placed in service on United Air Lines' routes between Medford and Seattle, California and the east. It was announced here yesterday by F. G. Johnson, United Air Lines president.

The new planes, embodying principles employed successfully in the recently constructed Boeing bomber and the Boeing Monomail, will have a cruising speed fully loaded of 155 miles per hour and a top speed of between 165 and 175 miles per hour. They will carry 10 passengers, 500 pounds of mail and express and will be manned by two pilots. Of low-wing, all-metal construction, the bi-motored transports will have retractable landing gear, which increases the speed approximately 20 miles per hour.

Mr. Johnson indicated that the new Boeing monoplane will mark a radical departure from present types of commercial ships and will be faster than any multi-motored transport plane now in service in this or other countries. The plane is said to approximate the principle of the flying wing and is completely streamlined. It will be powered by two supercharged Wasp engines, each developing approximately 350 horsepower.

The speed of the plane means that flying schedules of United Air Lines to the north and south will be substantially speeded up when the new planes are placed in service.
