

BLIZZARD VICTIMS STRUGGLED FAR IN SEARCH FOR CABIN

Funeral services were held today at Ashland, for Edwin C. Brown and wife, Dead Indian district homesteaders who lost their lives in a blizzard last January.

William Taylor, one of the discoverers of the bodies last Saturday, was in the city today, and said that the Browns traveled approximately 15 miles from the Cooley cabin, before they succumbed. The location of the bodies indicated Taylor said, they had stopped to rest. The body of the woman was found in the shelter of a log, as if she had laid down to sleep. A piece of paper was clasped in her hand. The sleeves of her dress were pulled down over her hands for warmth.

The body of Brown was a few feet away, and its position showed he had slumped over on his side from a sitting posture.

Taylor thinks the couple were endeavoring to reach the Dead Indian road, and the George Owen cabin, where they could have secured food and shelter.

He also thinks that the Browns missed their own cabin in the storm, and when it cleared about 9:00 o'clock they got their bearings, and traveled by starlight until daylight next morning when they were overcome with cold and exhaustion.

Five different spots were found where the Browns had attempted to start a fire. Matches were found in the clothing, Taylor says the couple, in the early stages of their journey, traveled in circles, but later took a straight course, missing the bad spots.

Taylor and companions spent 80 days in searching for the bodies.

SAVAGE DAM FISH LADDER IS SOUGHT

Frank Arringer, manager, has a setting of more than 700 eggs now under the hens and will have 2400 by the middle of June.

SOCIALISTS ADOPT PLANK FOR LIQUOR

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 25.—(AP)—A wet plank lay nalled today in the presidential campaign platform of the socialist party.

Adopted late yesterday in the waning hours of the national socialist convention here, it demands not only repeal of prohibition laws but government ownership and operation of breweries, with only one concession to dry sentiment—a provision for state option.

The convention adjourned shortly before midnight last night after four days of arduous work during which Norman Mattoon Thomas of New York was chosen the party's candidate for president and James H. Maurer of Harrisburg, Pa., his running mate.

Highway Widening Will Start Soon

SALEM, May 25.—(AP)—Work of widening the Pacific highway pavement between Salem and Brooks, covering a distance of eight miles, will get under way within the next few weeks, state highway officials announced today. The contract involves an expenditure of \$127,455. The present 16-foot pavement is to be widened to 20 feet.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—(AP)—President Hoover today nominated Captain Harry G. Hamlet of Port Townsend, Wash., to be commandant of the coast guard, with the rank of rear admiral, succeeding the late Rear Admiral Frederick C. Billard.

G. O. P. DRY PLANK TO BE DISCUSSED

WASHINGTON, May 25.—(AP)—President Hoover will hold another conference soon with party leaders in continuation of efforts to arrive at an understanding on the prohibition plank to be included in next month's convention platform.

This became known today as a high council of organized dry leaders was summoned to meet here next week to consider, among other things, how to attack the problem presented by a growing list of prominent prohibitionists in both parties coming out for a change or an opportunity for the people to express themselves again on the 18th amendment.
