

STORAGE BUTTER KEEPING VALUES AT LOW LEVELS

PORTLAND, May 25. — (AP) — Great increase in storage holdings of butter along the Pacific slope, as compared with this same period a year ago, appears a big factor against values, which are already at the lowest level known here for creamery make.

With production of butter holding up unusually well in the Pacific northwest and California flooded with supplies, the lowness of the Chicago price has created more or less fear of a liberal invasion of the coast markets by the west coast churning.

Market for eggs is practically without price change with more or less underselling continued by unattached producers selling direct to retailers. This is making it difficult for established firms to maintain values.

Good demand remains for chickens locally with no further change in the general price list. Demand is best for broilers weighing 2 1/2 lbs. and better, but all hens are meeting with favor.

Market for strawberries is holding very firm locally. What is believed to be the last car of California was reported in with sales \$1.75 for 20's. Oregon sold mostly \$2.25 to \$2.50 for 24's.
