FLOWERS UNFOLD ARRAY OF BEAUTY AT ANNUAL SHOW

Wafting their intoxicating fragrance through the scholastic atmosphere, and unfolding petals of many hues to offer a glorious array of color and beauty to hundreds of visitors wending their way through temporary paths—flowers of the garden, field and mountain took root this afternoon in the high school gymnasium for the annual show of the Medford Garden Club.

The gymnasium on South Oakdale opened to the public at 2 o'clock, and the show will continue through tomorrow, inviting all flower lovers into an enchanting realm, where roses, poppies and all fair sisters of the garden are blooming in numbers which more than double last year's highest record.

The show will be open evenings until 10 o'clock today and tomorrow and for all visitors unable to view the displays during the day, lighting arrangements have been completed to provide them an equally clear glimpse of the blossoms. Visitors are asked to use the south entrance to the gymnasium.

Entering the doors, they are greeted by a gorgeous group of peonies and red lilies, entered by C. E. Moyer of Roseburg. In the group are four varieties, Richard Carvel, the new red; Jules Ella, pink; Duchess de Nemours, creamy white; and Mme.

de Vernille, white with a red splash. The lilies, Siberian and Lilium Umbellatum, favor red. An iris display, entered by H. B. Russell of Grants Pass, whose gardens have been the gathering place of hosts of admirers during the past week, forms another enticing exhibit near the entrance.

On the far side of the gymnasium, bringing a hint of country life into the show, stands a cottage, with windows boxes overflowing with flowers and climbing. The porch is fitted with bright awnings from F. F. Burke's shop, and furniture, pleasing to all with a yen for lounging in the sun, loaned by Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter, whose many other artistic garden and flower arrangements are a lovely addition to the show.

Wall hangings and bowls of flowers entered by Mrs. M. Maruyama and other members of the Japanese colony inspire visitors to linger for a longer while. One of the most appealing displays is composed of covered wagon roses, the first flowers to adapt themselves to the demands of pioneer soil. Blooming as gaily as when they early brought a touch of beauty to the southern Oregon dooryard, they appear fragile, yet hardy reminders of the women who brought them across the hardships of the big trail, through from the home state.

In the wild flower exhibit, included in each year's garden show, are more than 100 varieties, all Oregon flowers. Ranging from the huge skunk cabbage to the delicate "cat ear" the list forms an educational as well as attractive showing.

An outstanding feature of this year's show is the display of table arrangements. Ready for tea, luncheon and bridge stands the group, dressed in artistic finery. Some in organdy clothes, others in plaid, all beckoning to guests to stop and chat and admire.

W. C. T. U. POLICY YET TO BE DRAWN
