### PUBLISHERS URGE HOOVER TO NAME PROSPERITY AIDES

WASHINGTON, May 26.—(AP)—Newspaper publishers who spoke at last night's conference with President Hoover were said at the White House today to have unanimously expressed approval of the setting up of committees to large cities similar to that under the chairmanship of Owen D. Young in New York, with the aim of helping business activity.  
The President outlined a program for "reconstruction committees" of leading men. He stressed the necessity for cooperative action in this direction as a remedy for ailing business. It was said, and received from the publishers, a unanimous expression of entire sympathy with the program.  
During the parley, it was added, there was a full discussion also of the general legislative situation, including the possibilities of a revival of the sales tax.

ABANDON HOG RAISING
